

Two New University Rotarians Inducted October 22, 2021 (text and photos from Rosemary Aragon)



Dieudonne Mayi ("Mayi") is sponsored by Ben Abe and hails from Cameroon.

Mayi is an IT consultant—a Principal Data Engineer Consultant for Slalom Consulting. As a data engineer, he designs (architects) and builds data platform solutions for clients including Fortune 500 companies. Translation: (1) building data pipelines to pull data from various enterprise sources (databases, data warehouses, flat files, streaming); applying business logic and data quality; then storing data in databases or data warehouses, for business applications (e.g., web applications, business intelligence and analytics) AND (2) building data repositories (databases, data warehouses) (*what we call "backend" in jargon*).

He has more than 20 years of professional experience in the IT industry: 12 years for Microsoft and eight years of consulting in data engineering with Logic 2020 Inc and now Slalom Consulting.

He holds a Master of Science in Computer Engineering along with an MA in Political Science from Portland State University. He also holds a 5-year degree in Industrial Engineering from the ENSPY (National Polytechnic School of Engineering) in Cameroon.

What brought him to the US from Cameroon? He came here to pursue a PhD in Computer Engineering at Portland State, through a scholarship from the Cameroon Ministry of Higher Education and USAID. Due to the lack of transfer of credits between Cameroon and the US, he was required to complete an MSc in Computer Engineering before starting the PhD program. He took a break from his PhD pursuit to work professionally and support his family and relatives back home. A t one point he thought about returning to Cameroon to help change the corrupt political system there. But, supporting his family was more important.

Mayi is now, once again, pursuing his PhD in Information Technology: from Walden University's online academic program. He will start his dissertation research mid-2022 and aims to graduate in 2023.

He is married to Bibi, whose brother was one of Mayi's schoolmates in Cameroon. They have three sons, Christian (33), Jean-Marie (30), Dieudonne Jr (23). They have one adorable grandson, Langston (3), who was born with a basketball in his hands, according to Mayi. Christian is a financial advisor at Morgan Stanley, lives with his wife Adrionna and son Langston in Newcastle, WA. Jean-Marie is a professional soccer player in Europe. Dieudonne Jr is a pharmacy technician living in Kent with his parents.



I asked Mayi how he and Ben Abe crossed paths. They met over 10 years ago, when serving on the Board of the African Chamber of Commerce Pacific Northwest. Says Mayi: "We have been friends since then."

I asked WHY ROTARY? The causes about which he is passionate?

His parents were both farmers. He says that education made him what he is today, and allowed him to raise his own family, come to the US, become US citizen and have a successful career. He believes education is key to development and to reducing poverty. That means helping educate children in Cameroon and Africa



(with computer education and school). He also wants to improve water and sanitation, empower women, and help peasant farmers to boost food production. He believes that Rotary can help him in those endeavors.

Mayi also shared that his first name—Dieudonne—is a common boy's name in Cameroon and means "God given" or "Gift of God." (continued on next page)

Jim Rechtien is from Missouri and his sponsor is Dale Hicklin.

Jim spent the last 35 years teaching and training physicians at Michigan State University in East Lansing. Three of those years were spent in a residence program at the University of Michigan Hospital in the field of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. Asking yourself, exactly what is Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation? It's the specialty that treats nonsurgical neuro-muscular-skeletal injuries and diseases and rehabilitates patients who have suffered catastrophic injuries or disease losses of function in those areas (for example, spinal cord injury and/or strokes, and progressive diseases like amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS)).

Michigan State University has two medical schools, an M.D. granting college and a D.O

(Doctor of Osteopathy) granting college. Jim worked for both colleges. Over a 13½ year period, he was the Chair of four departments: the Departments of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, Osteopathic Manipulative Medicine, Biomechanics, and Anatomy. In both Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation and Osteopathic Medicine, he encountered financially troubled programs. But he was able to right the ship and left both on a stable basis. Oh, he also taught Biomedical Materials in the College of Engineering at MSU. Looking at his academic and professional experience leading to Michigan State, you can see a good fit. Now retired, Jim is a Professor Emeritus at MSU.

Jim is an Osteopathic physician. He received that degree from the A.T. Still University, Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine, the oldest Osteopathic college in the US. He holds a PhD in Materials Science from Northwestern and a BS in Metallurgical Engineering from Purdue. Osteopathy emphasizes the structural integrity of the body in relation to health and he was well prepared in the science of structural relationships via his engineering background. In fact, his first position at MSU was with engineers working side-by-side with osteopathic physicians, trying to develop some of the basic science of the musculo-skeletal-neurological systems of importance in medicine. Prior to medical school, he worked on nuclear energy at the Argonne National Laboratory near Chicago. When President Nixon decided that all energy in the US would be based on carbon technologies (coal and natural gas), he saw a limited future in nuclear power. That is when he took an academic appointment and pursued his clinical degree -- and never looked back.

Jim was born and raised in St. Louis, Missouri. He met his wife, Mary Ann Ryan, in 1966. They have three children. Like Jim, all three graduated as engineers, then moved on to other occupations. His daughter, Catherine, lives in

Wallingford and holds a teaching certificate in secondary education. Son Matthew is the General Legal Counsel for a large international engineering firm in Houston. Son Timothy is a partner in a Chicago law firm specializing in general patent defense. Jim is the lucky grandfather of nine (ranging from ages 4 to 20). He says that the only unfortunate result of his children's education is that with two going to the U of Michigan and one to MSU, they can't ever watch a football game together!

What brought them to Seattle? Jim says: "After a meeting with my two sons and daughter where we asked them who was going to care for us in our old age, my two sons were fiddling with their shoelaces and brushing lint off their pant legs and my daughter, Catherine, looked up and made eye contact. That sealed her fate. We made the move to Seattle two years ago."

"The Mission of the Peacebuilder Committee of the University District Rotary Club is to advocate and support programs and projects designed to enhance peace and the non-violent management of conflict."


Thank you to all those Peacebuilder Committee members who worked with me over the past fifteen months to establish this concise and straightforward statement.
