John Turchi Retired Lake Oswego School District Principal

John was an educator for 35 vears. He started his career at Klamath Union High School. From there he began a long career in the Lake Oswego School District by moving to Lake Oswego HS. From there he was part of the original staff at Lake Ridge teaching US History and Government. While at Lake Ridge he became the Dean of Students. John moved on to Assistant Principal of Lake Oswego HS, then Principal at Lake Oswego HS, Principal of Lake Ridge and Principal of River Grove Elementary.

As the Dean of students at Lake Ridge, he and another Dean were responsible for student discipline. They had 1,200 students and 2 police liaison officers. His goal was to keep students who got into trouble out of the juvenile detention system. They did this by making sure there were consequences for their actions as a learning tool. Without turning children over for criminal prosecution.

Crimes included breaking and entering, vandalism, assault, drug use, drug possession, drug dealing, robbery, theft, physical and sexual harassment, and bullying.

They were successful at helping kids get back on the right track and during his time as Dean, he didn't have a single student prosecuted for a crime.

With the world as it is today, sometimes he wonders if kids across Portland and the region would have had the same opportunity for second chances as kids in Lake Oswego had.





Marcilyn Burke, Dean University of Oregon School of Law



It Is An Exciting Time to be a Duck.

The University of Oregon just had its largest entering class ever this year.

There are 4,600 1st year students. This is a 17% increase over last year.

This is also a banner year for aw schools across the country. 70,000 people applied to law schools last year across the country. This amounted to a 40% increase at the UofO law school.

Why so many? Marcilyn thinks that similar to the Nixon bump in new law students, there could be the Trump bump. It could also be an aggregate affect from the combination of the pandemic, social unrest, inequities that have recently been brought to light.

For law students there is a common drive to do good in the world. Of students, 44% want to go into politics, government or public service; 42% are passionate about justice; 35% want to be helpful to others; 32% want to advocate for social change.

So, this year there are 175 law students at UofO. They are seeing that these students are more academically prepared. The law student population includes 27% students of color, 25% LBGTQ, and 59% women.

Last year all classes were remote. This year they are back in person. All students and staff are required to be vaccinated, wear masks, and undergo regular testing. As of now, 95% are vaccinated.

The UofO law school is ranked 1st in the nation for legal research and writing, 10th in the nation in Environmental natural resources law, and 12th in the nation for Appropriate Dispute Resolution.

Currently they are working to expand Business Law, Diversity of Leadership, and Experiential Learning Opportunities. Their goal is to become the leader in environmental law

25% students are interested in business law so they are working to increase internship opportunities. And they are working on programs that help businesses accelerate to market.

Last year 90% of UofO Law students who took the Bar exam for the first time passed, showing the effectiveness of the UofO law curriculum.
