Madison is going to study International Law and diplomacy in Germany this fall. She hopes to become a future diplomat.


In high school, Madison has volunteered for many organizations, including Rose Haven shelter for women and children, and participated in Harvard's Model Congress learning how our democracy works.

Featured Program: Willamette Falls; A Grand Ronde Homeland By: Michael Karnosh





Michael was introduced by Candice Jennings. Michael is the Ceded Land Program Manager for the Confederated Tribe of Grand Ronde.

The tribes story spans over 15,000 years, according to Michael. He shared some ancient photos and sketches showing Native Americans fishing around Willamette Falls. The Claw-we-wal-la tribes inhabited both sides of the Willamette. They're descendants of the Chinook, and speak their language. The Grand Ronde entered into 7 different treaties with the United States in 1850.

The Ceded land consists about 14 million acres in Oregon and Idaho. Stories about the Willamette Falls were carried by word of mouth from generation to generation, and there are various versions. The stories involved fishing of salmon and eel.

The Willamette Falls was given various names over the years, and used to be a trade center, controlled by the Claw-we-wal-la. One would get permission by relation, or negotiate a trade.

With the Europeans arrival, the epidemics wiped out about 90% of the Clawwe-wal-la and the Clackamas tribes.

The tribes continues to be involved in the Falls, currently writing the master plan for the Blue Herron property with the city of Oregon City.
