President's Message

My message this week is about Learning by theory vs. Learning by doing, and it will also relate to our upcoming Olympics (video below). When I entered swab summer (1st year) club Leaders at the Coast Guard Academy, I had grown up being on all sizes and shape of boats, from kayaks, canoes, and fishing boats up to a friend's 35-foot salmon trawler. But my initial experience at CGA was with sailing dinghies and one thing on the water I hadn't done.

Every afternoon during swab summer we had nautical science from 1-4PM (July - Aug 1968). During that time we learned knots in the boathouse, experienced maintenance (painting), climbing the rigging, and learned all 130 lines on the training Barque Eagle (my background picture on zoom) for our 2 week summer cruise to Martha's Vineyard But the last 3 weeks of NautSci was qualifying on sailing dinghies. It was the hottest part of August and good time to be on the water. We learned the theory of sailing (how far into the wind you can tack, how to shift the boom on a tack or jibe, etc.) and we were paired up in the boats to demonstrate our newly learned skills. Then we would have races around a set course. I was always paired with a novice like myself and would be somewhere in the middle of the pack of 25 or so dinghies. We had the theory (didn't capsize), but not the experience. At end of the first week the instructor announced that everyone who finished in the top 3 of the 2 afternoon races (the captain - person on the tiller) would be qualified and could skip the last week of NautSci (the rest would be in remedial sailing that last week). A week of afternoons off in the Rec center (off limits for the upper class) was a HUGE incentive for us.

The first 3 days of the races I was nowhere near the top 3 in any heat. But being a hunter and a keen observer of nature, I did notice that Greg Goodwin (from Texas), who was in my Company, was always near the front (and had already qualified), so on day 4 I got in line right behind him and was paired with him. He was an experienced racing sailor, and during one day of sailing he taught me more about racing than I had learned in the previous 2 weeks. Things like minimizing tacks and Jibes that slow you down, how to steer to maximize speed on tacks and pulling up the retractable keel when sailing down wind (best tip). Greg dropped out of CGA, but I remember him still for helping me get qualified with a 2nd place finish and getting 15 hours of bliss in the Recreation room my last week of swab summer!!

In the video below (in the Bulletin) you will learn about LT Nikole Barnes a 2017 graduate of CGA who is the first Coastie to be allowed to train for the Olympics while on active duty in the Coast Guard (she serves in Miami). Other services have done this for years for Olympic athletes. In fact Bill Dellinger, Bronze Medalist in 1964 in the 5000 meters, was in the Air Force while competing. Dellinger was also the track coach (and my PE teacher in 67) at Thurston High School prior to becoming the coach at the U of O. Nikki was an all American sailor at CGA, and someone I will be rooting for in the


