Then there was a terrible scandal involving their Central Bank in which it was discovered the bank was involved in a Ponzi-like scheme where they were borrowing money to pay down other debt.

I will always hold Lebanon dear to my heart because many years ago, I was vacationing with my parents at a very elite resort in the South of France. My parents were nothing if not fond of French food, and this particular resort had a very famous chef while at the same time billed itself as a place to lose weight. If that makes any sense. I was surrounded by many very overweight people who all love to dine on fancy French food. A big group (both large and numerous) of Lebanese people were part of this crowd. It turned out that they were Maronite Christians and part of a political party. One of them, whom they claimed would surely be the next prime minister, took a liking to me. I heard he was murdered soon after he returned to Lebanon though, which I hope is not true. He talked to me about Lebanon and what a wonderful place it was. He was kind and interesting, but to me he was just an overweight old man (he was around 40). At some point, one of his aides approach my father for information about my marital status and I think he asked about my virginity (he would have been sorely disappointed had father answered him, but he pretended not to understand the question-though he was certainly willing to laugh about it to his friends afterwards). He then cornered me in the exercise room to discuss my suitability for the position of career wife. Oblivious as usual, I excitedly described my future plans to travel the world and obtain a doctorate in Third World Development. Needless to say, I did not pass the test; there was no proposal to be had for this adventurous rebel. We said our goodbyes, and that was the end of my Lebanese experience. But it was fun while it lasted, and I still hold the Lebanese dear to my heart because of it!

Looking Glass has been serving our community since 1970. It began with a small group of student volunteers helping youth on the streets. It has grown into one of the largest behavioral health agencies in the state. While many of the needs and issues are the same, a lot has changed.

Craig is President/Chief Executive Officer of Looking Glass. He spent the first part of his career as a therapist providing direct care and clinical supervision. The last 25 years have been focused on policy, program development and system improvements. Craig served as Executive Director of the MCCRC for 5 years. He also taught classes on adolescent behavioral health at Portland State University and Lewis and Clark College.
