#### The Chinstrap Penguins of Elephant Island

Antarctica's windswept Elephant Island may be best known as the bleak refuge of British explorer Ernest Shackleton and his crew after they lost their ship *Endurance* in 1916. Today, the island is a stronghold for thousands of nesting Chinstrap Penguins. To find out how these penguins are faring, Noah Strycker traveled to the island in 2021 with a team of Stony Brook University researchers on the Greenpeace ship *Esperanza*. Their mission was to count the penguins breeding there—a feat that had been done only once before, 50 years earlier by a British Joint Services expedition. From *Endurance* to *Esperanza*, Strycker recounts the adventures of life on the Southern Ocean—and follows the changing fortunes of the Chinstrap Penguins of Elephant Island. This presentation will give you an uncommon view of the most common penguin in the Antarctic.

Noah Strycker, 36 (dob: 2-9-86), is Associate Editor of Birding magazine, the author of six well-regarded books about birds, a penguin scientist, and a regular contributor of photography and articles to all major bird magazines as well as other media. In 2021, he earned a master's degree with honors from New York's Stony Brook University, focusing his research on Chinstrap Penguins. In 2015, Strycker set a world Big Year record, and his 2017 book, Birding Without Borders, relates the experience. His other books are Among Penguins (Oregon State University Press, 2011), The Thing with Feathers (Riverhead Books, 2014), Birds of the Photo Ark (National Geographic, 2018), National Geographic Guide to the Backyard Birds of North America (National Geographic, 2019), and Birding Basics (National Geographic, 2022). Strycker has studied birds on six continents with field seasons in Panama, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Hawaii, Maine, Michigan, Australia, Antarctica, the Galapagos Islands, and the Farallon Islands. He also works as a naturalist guide on expedition cruises to Antarctica and Norway's Svalbard archipelago, literally spreading the inspiration of birds from pole to pole. Strycker is a competitive tennis player, has run five marathons, and hiked the 2,650-mile Pacific Crest Trail from Mexico to Canada. He is based in Creswell, Oregon, where his backyard has hosted more than 100 species of birds. Visit his website at: www.noahstrycker.com





# **Environmental Committee Report**

Action Alert - Rotary International Area of Focus: The Environment

In 2020, Rotary International (RI) and The Rotary Foundation (TRF) adopted "Supporting the Environment" as a new Area of Focus and published an accompanying Policy

Statement. The statement provides eight major goals for Rotary in the area of environment that each of us can support. <a href="https://rcatnow.com/wp-content/uploads/2020/11/RI-Board-Sept-2020-Environment-Area-of-Focus-Policy-Statement-1.pdf">https://rcatnow.com/wp-content/uploads/2020/11/RI-Board-Sept-2020-Environment-Area-of-Focus-Policy-Statement-1.pdf</a> In 2021, our Club established the Environmental Committee to address matters described in that Policy Statement.

The fourth goal in the statement is "Addressing the Causes of Climate Change and Supporting Measures to Reduce the Emissions of Greenhouse Gases". Our committee feels this needs to be addressed right now. The new report by the International Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), which is the United Nations body for assessing the science related to climate change, tells us that the window of opportunity to prevent the average global temperature from rising more than 1.5 to 2.0 degrees centigrade is closing fast. It also makes clear that the technologies and policies to adequately address climate change exist; the only thing missing is political will.

The Yale Climate Opinion polls <a href="https://climatecommunication.yale.edu/visualizations-data/ycom-us/">https://climatecommunication.yale.edu/visualizations-data/ycom-us/</a>, and other polls consistently show that a majority of Americans are worried about the effects of climate change and want Congress to act. Now is the time to let our senators and representatives know that you want action. Tell them that you want effective climate change legislation passed **this year**.

A. If you are a recipient, you must report back to the Committee with information on how grant funds were spent and the effectiveness/results of the program or project funded. This report is due before the end of the calendar year.

### Women's Institute on Leadership and Disability (WILD)

Rotarians have been so generous in supporting our Women's Institute on Leadership and Disability (WILD) that brings together women with disabilities from around the world to Eugene. With your generous support, this Summer we will bring 35 disabled women from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Botswana, Brazil, Burundi, Cameroon, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Egypt, El Salvador, Ethiopia, Guatemala, India, Indonesia, Iraq, Kenya, Lesotho, Malawi, Mauritius, Mexico, Mongolia, Mozambique, Nepal, Nigeria, Pakistan, Peru, Philippines, Poland, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, Uganda, and Vietnam.

We now need a miracle. We need to find homestay families for each of these women. Please know your house does not have to be wheelchair accessible as women have different disabilities that don't require wheelchair accessibility, but all of them have a passion to meet new people and learn about our country and our culture, especially here in beautiful Eugene and Springfield.

You can host for one or both sessions and the dates are as follows:

1st session: June 4 – 10 (7 nights) 2nd session: June 11 – 17 (7 nights)

Please know we have very strict procedures and all women will be required to be fully vaccinated and will be tested before getting on the plane. We will also be having them stay at a hotel for the first few days where we will administer more COVID tests. We ask that all homestay families also be vaccinated.


If you've read the April issue of "Rotary" magazine you may have read the column written by John Germ, the Chair of The Rotary Foundation (TRF). The main point of the column is that because of increasing needs across the world over the past decade, the amount of global grants has grown by more than 100% while annual giving from Rotary members has remained relatively static. That is certainly true of our own club as our member participation in supporting TRF has averaged just 35% over the past ten years. Our YTD Foundation giving through March is also at a multi-year low.

### World Athletics Championships Oregon 22 - Host a Volunteer

Over 2,000 athletes and thousands of fans and other support personnel will be coming to Eugene-Springfield July 15-24, 2022 for the World Athletics Championships Oregon 22. This is the premiere track and field meet outside of the Olympic Games and it's the first

time it's been held on U.S. soil. As you can imagine, accommodations is an issue for an event this size. The athlete's will be staying in an athlete village on the UO campus, but spectators, sponsors, officials, media and fans will be staying in commercial lodging.

Over 1,500 volunteers will be selected to work at the event. Many volunteers will come from our region, but others will come from out of state or from another country. With accommodations filling up, we thought there may be an opportunity for Rotarians to fill the gap. Rotarians have experience hosting other Rotarians and students, so what better way to show the world our great hospitality and for Rotarians to have a great experience meeting a volunteer.

# Popeye The Sailor Man

His real name was Frank "Rocky" Fiegel. He was born in 1868 in Poland and, as a child, immigrated to the United States with his parents, who settled down in a small town in Illinois. As a young man, Rocky went to sea. After a 20 year career as a sailor in the Merchant Marines, Fiegel retired. He was later hired by Wiebusch's Tavern in the city of Chester, Illinois as a 'Bouncer' to maintain order in the rowdy bar. Rocky quickly developed a reputation for always being involved in fighting (and usually winning). As a result, he had a deformed eye ("Pop-eye"). He also 'always' smoked his pipe, so he always spoke out of one side of his mouth. In his spare time as a Bouncer, Rocky would entertain the customers by regaling them with exciting stories of adventures he claimed to have had over his career as a sailor crossing the 'Seven Seas. The creator of Popeye, Elzie Crisler Segar, grew up in Chester and, as a young man, met Rocky at the tavern and would sit for hours listening to the old sailor's amazing 'sea stories. Years later, Segar became a cartoonist and developed a comic strip called 'Thimble Theater. He honoured Fiegel by asking if he could model his new comic strip character, 'Popeye the Sailor Man,' after him. Naturally Fiegel was flattered and agreed. Segar claimed that 'Olive Oyl,' along with other characters, was also loosely based on an actual person. She was Dora Paskel, owner of a small grocery store in Chester. She apparently actually looked much like the Olive Oyl character in his comics. He claimed she even dressed much the same way. Through the years, Segar kept in touch with Rocky and always helped him with money; giving him a small percentage of what he earned from his 'Popeye' illustrations. WHO didn't love the cartoons??? We watched them religiously ... so funny, so moral ... each story had a good ending ... wonder if kids these days even KNOW who Popeye is??? Who knew he was a real man?? Awesome!!!
