- Nitrogen + Phosphorus = green bacteria

- Only the green algae (the good algae) is eaten by fish.

- Unfortunately cannot remove the Cyanobacteria algae without harming the green algae and disrupting our lake.

- Clearlake is not unique. Algae blooms are happening all over California. Especially in the ancient waters.

- because it is widespread the state is trying to make a priority of handling.

- with the drought the lake temp is increasing and phosphorus is increasing which is a recipe for the blooms.

- We have to be super diligent re our invasive species such as the quagga and zebra mussels. They can significantly alter the lake and the fishing revenue we get from the lake. These mussels only eat the good algae taking away valuable nutrients needed by our fish.

- Anyone using drinking water from the lake is paying the highest rate in CA.

- much of the funding for studying the lake & invasive species comes from sales of stickers you put on your boat.

- Post wildfire and drought obviously impact our lake with burn runoff and ash. More phosphorus.

- one scenario is we will see the historic milestone of the lowest lake levels ever by Nov. 1. Or not.
