Citizens' Climate Lobby is a nonprofit, nonpartisan, grassroots advocacy organization focused on national policies to address climate change.

Thier consistently respectful, non-partisan approach to climate education is designed to create a broad, sustainable foundation for climate action across all geographic regions and political inclinations. By building upon shared values rather than partisan divides, and empowering our supporters to work in keeping with the concerns of their local communities, they work towards the adoption of fair, effective, and sustainable climate change solutions.

Paul Larkin presented:

Carbon emissions are rising. Earth's temperature is up 1.8 degrees since the Industrial Revolution. We have experienced the 20 warmest years on record. Weather disasters are increasing.

Climate change is having several effects on California:

- Droughts
- Wildfires year-round fire seasons
- Rainfall
- Diminishing snowfall
- Die-off of kelp, abalone, starfish

97% of climate scientists say climate change is REAL and caused by humans burning fossil fuels. Visit skepticalscience.com if you have questions about this.

How long do we have? 12 years to cut global emissions by 50%

In order to lower emissions, CCL suggests we make it EXPENSIVE.....thus HR 763 was introduced and proposes:

- collect a carbon fee on fossil fuel sources
- increase fee annually
- pause on regulations, let market system work for 10 years
- projected 40% reduction in emissions in 12 years

Economists agree this can prove effective in promoting green energy.

Good for people: 227,000 lives saved

Good for the economy: 2.1 million new jobs in 10 years 3 million in 20 years
