Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE)

NEWS FROM RI:

Sadly, RYE will be dark for another year. The following is an excerpt from RI President Holger Knaack's letter to the Rotary community:

"With the continued uncertainty of the pandemic and COVID-19 virus variants, inconsistent disease mitigation efforts, and the global imbalance of vaccine access - the board has decided to suspend the Youth Exchange program through 30 June 2022.

"The RI board's decision was informed by scientific data, global health guidance and a number of factors required to guarantee a safe, equitable and quality experience. Given the global imbalance of access to the COVID-19 vaccine and the financial impact of the pandemic, many areas of the world would be unable to participate in 2021. Moving forward with only the limited number of participating countries with access to the vaccine would contradict Rotary's core value of fairness and commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion.

WHAT'S NEXT?

"Flexibility" (of spirit) is key to a successful exchange and exchange program! Our 10 disappointed 202122 Outbound ambassadors will surely consider future options for going abroad. Whether the exchange is for a year, a month or something in between, whether it includes an education component, or has a primarily cultural or service focus, all will invariably impact the lives of those who choose to sample a new culture.
