

Rotary Minute buy John Vandermolen

August 1, 1912, the Rotary Club of London was chartered as the first Rotary Club in Europe. Prior to this, In April of this year, the Rotary Club of Winnipeg Canada was chartered. Making London the first intercontinental Rotary club.

Up until this point, Rotary Clubs were exclusively in the United States. This is when the organization changed its title from National Association of Rotary Clubs, to International Association of Rotary Clubs. Now, between Great Brittan and the USA, there were 50 Rotary clubs. In 1921, a club was chartered in Spain, and so it began!

Program


Marty introduced our speakers today, David Simmer and PDG Barb Spangler. They presented a dynamic, eye-opening program a water project in the Navajo Nation. Yes, there are people right here in the US without access to clean water.

The Navajo Nation is about the size of West Virginia and has a population of approximately 175,000. Unemployment is 50%, and 44% of the children live in poverty. About 40%, or 70,000 live without indoor running hot and cold water and utilize about 7 gallons of water a day. This compares with the average American who utilizes approximately 100,000 gallons a day.

In order for the Navajo to get their water, they must drive miles to the water source and cart back what they can carry in assorted barrels and buckets in their vehicle. The water is then stored outside and covered with blankets to protect it from dust and animals.

The DeepDig solution: Navajo homeowners can apply for a water storage system that holds 1200 gallons through DeepDig. DeepDig, founded in 2012, is a non-profit organization partnering with Rotary and other supporters. The cost of the water storage system costs \$4500 with includes transport trucks to routinely refill the storage systems every 3-4 weeks. Recipients of the water storage units, if able, as asked to aid in installation of future water storage units. Rotary has provided 25% of the funding. Rotary will continue to support DeepDig though global grants. If clubs are interested in participating, they can make a reservation while awaiting the global grant approval.

This was a very impactful program. We think of water projects as being needed in developing countries. This concern with the Navajo nation is right here in our own backyard. Thank you, David and Barb, for a well delivered presentation.



Navajo Water Project

Navajo Nation Water Poverty:

- 70K (i.e. 40% of the Navajo) live without "indoor" hot and cold running water and/or toilet
- The avg. American family consumes/utilizes 100 gallons of water per day
- The average Navajo family consumes/utilizes 7 gallons of water per day














Navajo access to clean water:

- United Nations: traditional *hub and spoke* water systems not economically feasible in Navajo Nation
- The Challenges:
- Weather dictates underground piping to protect from freezing
- Caliche virtually impenetrable calcium carbonate rock
- Sacred lands; Very difficult terrain
- Clan-based communities remote homes
