

Not to be held back, Mary Crumley stepped in again and tapped out for her and Tom♦s September 4 anniversary that was missed by our Pres.




Marty then introduced Heather Edwards, a 2014 Rotary GSE participant, to talk to us about the history and meaning of Project Amigo, in the Mexican state of Colima, and headquartered in the rural, mountain agricultural village of Cofradia. She noted that the project started as a way to present gifts to the children of the area for Christmas (Navidad, Fiesta week), went on to have vision and dental clinics, and has blossomed into a full on Rotary Areas of Focus for education and literacy, as well as community involvement in various local holiday activities throughout the year in the state of Colima. The non-profit organization has work weeks for volunteer people interested in assisting the local people with learning English, preparing for means to learn trades, and getting supplies of food to feed the students at the school set up to bring primary and secondary education opportunities to a very poor area. Gerardo then spoke of his opportunity to be the first in his family to go through secondary education and on to the University level for education in IT, with his passion for GPS communications to rural areas. He is working at a bank in the city of Guadalajara, Jalisco State, and very thankful for his opportunity for education. His younger brother is now also participating in the schooling process. The project is sustained by donations and participation of volunteers and you can learn more at www.projectamigo.org. I think you will be impressed by what is being done there.
