Eddie Morgan introduced our speaker, Prof. Vicki Sama

Professor Vicky Sama is the Chair of the Department of Journalism and Mass Communication at Humboldt State University. She has been at HSU for 14 years teaching courses in Media Law, Ethics, War Reporting, Sports Journalism, Video Production and Magazine Production.

She completed her graduate degree in Media Research at the University of Colorado in Boulder, authoring the paper "Patriotism and the Press: the Red, White and Blue News Coverage of the 9/11 Terrorist Attacks."

After Boulder, she moved to Brazil and taught International Journalism courses focusing on U.S. hegemony in international media at Universidade de S�o Paulo and C�sper L�bero. Her professional journalism career spans more than two decades including her work as a CNN field producer in Latin America covering cocaine cartels, guerrilla wars and violent presidential elections; copy editing documentaries for PBS, writing for Newsweek and other magazines; and back in the day, being a grunt production assistant covering events such as USFL football, U.S. Open Golf and the New York City Marathon for ABC Wide World of Sports.

She is the faculty adviser for the Journalism Club, taking her students each year to the nation's news hubs such as New York and Washington, D.C. Last October, she had the pleasure of taking journalism students to the Supreme Court to watch Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg in person in one of her last sessions on the bench. The students also visited NPR, CNN's Situation Room with Wolf Blitzer, Politico, Washington Post and a host of museums in the week-long trip.

Professor Sama is the former long-time adviser of the award-winning student *Osprey* magazine. Outside of class you can find her riding her bicycle, probably in the mud.

Vicki's topic was about challenges that students see throughout the reporting. Especially in today's environment where it's challenging to report the news and not be distracted by the atmosphere surrounding them. She talked about freelance journalist journals that work for an organization and of course the citizen journalist who is anyone of us when we record report and delivered information to the masses. Of course, many of the challenges are that citizen reporters perhaps not present the full story which is something that is emphasized strongly to journalism students. Bad actors and journalism are also reducing the faith and journalism in general which in some cases they're doing on purpose.

Questions were asked of Vicky by a number of members about accurate and non-accurate information that's being disseminated by journalists or citizen journalists. Eddie asked questions about challenges journalists major college students are facing.

HSU teaches a course of media management. In response to Roland's question Vicki pointed out that many of the students at HSU in journalism do get their first steps into their profession locally through local news outlets be it printed electronic or A/V. However, our market is very small and of course many will move on. Also talked about the difference between balance as far as time versus balance as far as context.

There was a conversation about how the news has migrated from being reporting of news to now being short snippets of news and much opinion. Vicki also emphasized not to be beholden to just one media outlet and actually watch other media outlets that are not normally used by you.

John adjourned the meeting at 1:30
