Peace Award Nominees

The Berkeley Rotary Peace Committee is pleased to present the following three nominees for your consideration and vote as our Peace awardee for the year 2020.

We will have an online Zoom vote at a club meeting in the near future.

1) The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation (a nominee last year), an American private foundation founded by Bill and Melinda Gates. Based in Seattle, Washington, it was launched in 2000 and is reported to be the largest private



foundation in the world. The primary goals of the foundation are, globally, to enhance healthcare and reduce extreme poverty, and in the U.S., to expand educational opportunities and access to information technology. It has contributed generously in matching funds to Rotary's Polio Plus fundraising.

2) Greta Thunberg (a nominee last year), a Swedish environmental activist who has gained international recognition for promoting the view that humanity is facing an existential crisis arising from climate change. Thunberg is known for her youth and her straightforward speaking manner, both in public and to political leaders and assemblies, as she challenges world leaders for their failure to take sufficient action to address the climate crisis. She has received two consecutive nominations for the Nobel Peace Prize (2019 and 2020).

3) Dr. Anthony Fauci and Frontline Healthcare Workers Around the World. Dr. Fauci has served as the director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) since 1984. Since January 2020, he has been the lead physician to address the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States. As a physician with the National Institutes of Health (NIH), Fauci has served American public health in various capacities for over 50 years. He has made contributions to HIV/AIDS research and other immunodeficiencies. We also recognize with this award the heroism of Frontline Healthcare Workers Around the World who risk their own health and lives to minimize the spread and effect of COVID-19.
