Pres. Chris' Latest Success - Club Raises \$85,000 for Polio Plus

Gov. Mark Roberts and our President Chris Ahoy priorized Polio Plus as the big District and club effort of the year given the COVID shutdown of new international service projects, and our club responded, raising more than \$85,000 for Polio Plus and the vaccination infrastructure that is also used to address COVID and other pandemics. More than 46 club members (41.7% of club members) donated over \$11,000 in monies which, with the District, anonymous donor, RI, and Gates Foundation matches raised the \$85,000 plus for Polio Plus. In addition to earning the huge match for the first \$100 of their donations in their own names, members honored 14 non-Rotarian family members or deceased Rotarians to

increase the match earned.

The late Dr. Ed Waller, long the club and District leader in Polio Plus, was among club Rotarians so honored. Some 13 members gave well more than the \$100 "ask" but that still earned the Gates Foundation match tripling the money for Polio Plus, just not the 10.5 match. Rotarians will likely not see a match as big as this one again. We all helped save 187 lives by the calculus of the UN and the World Health Organizaton. Well done, club. And thanks to David Campbell and the Foundation Committee for leading the fundraising effort for Polio Plus and for the Foundation "shares" program each year.
