## District Grant presentation to our club s international service program

DG nominee **Claire Roberts** and our club s International Services Director **Susan Cohen Grossman** shared how the \$8,720 in district grant funds will outfit one segment of the community s cultural center, now under construction in one of the poorest neighborhoods in Guatemala City. More

specifically, our funds will help to equip the multi-sport court on the top level of the building. Although there have been delays in construction - due in large part to the pandemic - completion of the project is anticipated next year. Susan promised to keep us informed about that progress.

After this excursion to Guatemala, Prez Ron took us back to the border by introducing Border Patrol Agent and Tribal liaison Francisco Theron from the San Diego Region. BPA Theron threw out a lot of numbers: like San Diego is 1 of 20 sections, controls only 3% of the border but also 930 miles of coastline with only about 2,000 agents including horse units, canine units and ATV units plus a SWAT Team and a Border Rescue Team.



The focus is on drug trafficking as well as illegal immigration. Apprehensions have more than doubled from

2020-2021 but the subjects came from 146 different countries not many Mexicans - 3700 unaccompanied kids among them in 21. So sad!

There are 3 ways that people or drugs cross the border besides just trying to walk, drive or swim across: through tunnels, small aircraft now including drones and small boats. All of these methods especially tunneling are expensive, so they are used mostly by drug cartels that have the money. When asked by **David Litty**, BPA Theron did state that the walls help them to fulfil the law, but there are only 50-60 miles of them and many uncompleted sections now have to be guarded by personnel.

Apropos asylum applicants: BPAs turn them over to a different department of asylum counselors (news to me). However, the asylum courts are so backlogged that it can take 4-6 years to enter this country legally, so often those applicants are released into the US and drug czars are well aware of that and know all the ropes to sneak their minions by. Though staying non-political, agent Theron emphasized that we desperately need immigration reform and a lot more staffing for those agencies and courts to relieve the pressure and keep everyone safer. By the way, there is less trafficking in Marijuana in recent years - may be related to the legalization, maybe not **♦** hard drugs have increased.

The meeting concluded with giving red- badger **Nicole Sullivan** the mike, who did a credible job with the 4-way test and then creatively used it to tie in to her field of expertise in a lively, well-timed presentation. **Nicki** has



had 3 careers, but is now a reverse mortgage consultant. She made a case for how the program is true and fair as it is well regulated and helpful to retirees, and how it is beneficial as it increases financial flexibility and the borrower is protected if the market goes south. (Side note: it is actually

insured by the FHA).


In the interest of time we skipped birthdays and anniversaries this week, but I want to close with two **community service announcements** from **Bill Bobetsky**:




1846 Elias Howe takes out a US patent for a lockstitch sewing machine



1933 1st Negro League All-Star Game, West beats East 11-7 (Comiskey Park)




1950 Joe DiMaggio becomes 1st to hit 3 HR in a game at Griffith Stadium
