PROGRAM

Today's speaker was Lonnie Bristow, M.D., a past president of the AMA and a Rossmoor resident. He spoke about times in his career where he felt he had made a difference.



He accompanied four state's Attorney Generals to confront the big tobacco industry. The outcome of the legal action was a settlement of \$200 million and an agreement to stop marketing to teens. Fifty years ago the smoking rate was 48% now it is down to 16%.

Forty years ago in an interview with ABC he

stated that it was against the code of ethics for a medical doctor to administer drugs resulting in executions. The result was doctors no longer participated in executions. This virtually stopped the practice in California. He also stopped inhumane medical treatments of incarcerated people. For example, now pain control must be used in wound treatment.

Bristow then spoke about being a tutor/mentor at Bishop Boy's Ranch. The outcome of this program is very low recidivism compared with juvenile hall. The County Board of Supervisors wants to close the ranch and transfer all residents there to juvenile hall. Dr. Bristow was passionate about reforms needed in the treatment of juvenile offenders. He wants to see a rehabilitation model not a punishment one. In favor of his argument he stated that between 35% to 50 % of incarcerated juveniles have mental illness.

This program was well received with many questions.
