There has been an increase in overall Covid cases. As of Tuesday, July 7th, California recorded more than 9,018 new coronavirus cases, a record-breaking daily count. The Bay Area counties documented 470 new cases, for a total of 30,862. The outbreak continues to surge across the state with a total of 283,750 cases statewide. California also recorded the third-highest daily count of deaths - 111- on Tuesday, 8 of those coming from the Bay Area.

This is largely due to much more testing of young people. This also may be due to more people gathering in large groups. They think that the reason that more cases are testing positive, is that many more people are testing positive, but, also, many more are being tested.

Coronavirus cases among youth appear to be driving the nation's surge. Young people between 18 and 29 are filling more hospital beds than at the start of the pandemic, with a 299% increase in hospitalizations from mid-April to late June, according to a UCSF analysis of Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data. At UCSF, 14% of people in the same age range who tested positive through the health system needed inpatient care.

Child infection rates are quite small, mostly because children are not being tested in high frequency. It has also been found that children have a low likelihood of spreading the virus even if they have it. There is, in general, no increased rate in children and they are not spreading the disease.

There is a 50% increase in regular and ICU beds for both Covid and Non-Covid cases. There is also an increase in ICU admissions, especially those who have been denied access to medical care. Our county shows an increase in overall tested and positive cases.

The percentages of Covid-related hospital cases in California are low, 2 - 12%. In Contra Costa County, only about 2% of hospital cases are Covid. UCSF is also not seeing a major surge in Covid cases. Most hospitals are practicing according to guidelines, and a few like UCSF are excellent.

Many nurses and other health care workers have been affected by Covid. Some SF General nurses said the rise in infections, while representing a similar community spike, was also the result of an environment where it is hard to social distance and not all workers are tested. Nurses estimated dozens of people come through the small break room that has lockers, showers, and a table for eating — which cannot be done while wearing a mask.

Other states in the U.S. have been resistant to following recommended guidelines. For example, the governor of Florida has encouraged opening schools, saying that their severity rate of the disease is not as serious as most believe. Many have politicized adherence to Covid-19 precautions.
