Foundation Business: Joy led off the Rotary Foundation announcement as part of the Foundation Annual Meeting. We approved the appointment of Marlene Miller and Bob Sutherland to the board.

Rotary Foundation Awards: Bea announced two foundation gifts. The Winter Night Shelter was given \$2,500. They have at least twenty families under their care which lasts from September to June of each year.

Choice in Aging, an adult day care program for Alzheimer's patients, was awarded \$8,000. The patients pay \$80 per day for this care.







John mentioned the John Muir Trust who is seeking donations.

PROGRAM

Our speaker was Asher Garfinkle who is Vice President



of the Golden West Chapter of the ALS Society. ALS stands for Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis. This disease causes the brain to lose its ability to

communicate with the peripheral muscles which results in loss of breathing, movement, and speaking, among other things.

There are two types of ALS. Ninety percent of cases are sporadic. The other ten percent of cases are familial. Those with the gene for ALS seem to get ALS about fifty percent of the time. Trauma increases the incidence of the disease. There are no specific treatments that can cure ALS but there are two treatments that slow the disease down slightly, and multi-disciplinary care helps as well. ALS is largely managed symptomatically. The cost to manage a patient with ALS is about \$200,000 per year. Victims of ALS usually live two to five years.

The ALS Society has twentysix other chapters. The East Bay Walk to Defeat ALS will take place at Heather Farms Park on November 12, 2019.
