## PROGRAM

Our speaker, Dr. Seema Yasmin, addressed the topic “When Epidemics and Politics Collide”. Dr. Yasmin is a British physician who was trained at Cambridge. Currently, she is affiliated with both Stanford and the Center for Disease Control where she served as an officer in the Epidemic Intelligence Services investigating disease outbreaks. She is also an Emmy award winning journalist. Dr. Yasmin has a new book coming out in January 2021 called “Viral B.S.: Medical Myths & Why We Fall for Them” available at Amazon for prepurchase.

Dr. Yasmin began speaking about pandemics from an historical perspective, mentioning AIDS and HIV. She contended that major problems arise when we ignore science and listen to misinformation and disinformation. The current pandemic has gotten worse because of the politics surrounding the actual science. Because politicians have a political agenda, the CDC website has gone dark and Covid information has suddenly disappeared. There is the fear that people will lose faith in the CDC because it is constantly being discredited. One example of how politics encroached on science is when President Trump falsely claimed that hydroxychloroquine was a Covid cure. As a result, thirty-nine percent of Americans have used it. There are many other “snake oil” cures out there.

She said there was a sense of urgency for a cure as death rates in the U.S. have spiked. Last week 6,500 Texans died. Covid test results need to be available within three days; taking nineteen days is just not useful. The way the U.S. is handling the pandemic is wrong because many are not listening to the scientists. If everyone had sheltered in place for six to eight weeks, we could have been back to normal. Unfortunately, the CDC does not have enough power to keep the pandemic from happening again.

Until a vaccine is available, she stressed the importance of everyone following safety guidelines including mask wearing and social distancing. Herd immunity can best be achieved by a combination of those who have unfortunately been sick and those who are vaccinated. Even then we should continue being sensible. Those in power must be held responsible for bungled responses.
