### **PROGRAM**

Speaker Tim McClanahan is the son of Mitzi Bray. He works for the Wildlife Conservation Society in Africa and studies coral reefs, fish, climate change, and the problems surrounding them. Also he works with "commons" shared resources of private and collective ownership. Private property management is critical for coral reefs. Tim attended UC Santa Cruz and did his graduate work at the University of Florida. Coral reefs are 11 million years old and have corporate ownership. Threats are biological and social including; climate

change (sunlight and atmosphere), watershed pollution, and fishing. He also deals with the fact that people don't pay for the cost of fishing. Tim believes in the philosophy of Elinor Ostrom, a Noble prize winner who focused on "commons" problems including; non-renewable resources, group identity, proportionality, decision making, consequences (legal system), conflict resources, autonomy, and sustainable fisheries. WCS has a large scale tropical program featuring water temperature (a threat to coral reefs like those in Indonesia that are heat sensitive).

Tim work with fishing in Kenya and Tanzania. He works with fishing communities and explains science, fishing and managing coral reef systems. He stresses agreeable collective action.



Government principles stress decision making processes (are they fair), monitoring, cost factors which are all weak. Tim's job is to work on this. There are two groups of people – positive and hard to manage. To monitor resources positively there is a better outcome with jobs and income. Tim manages collective plans, monitoring and mirroring. An example of a problem now is the Great Barrier Reef, which has declined over time. For more information email WCS.org.
