Kaytlynne Michelle Deardorf 08-01-2019 1 Year Norway. In 2015, 31,145 people applied for refugee status in Norway and 10,300 of these were children. As many of you remember, Europe was over-run by refugees. There were three times as many refugees that year than the average number for the past ten years in Norway. It was estimated 3-4,000 people died crossing the Mediterranean (1 million crossed).

Because of the dangers, refugees began taking the eastern route through Russia, the Arctic Circle, and into Norway. They crossed the border on bicycles because of a Russian law that one cannot leave Russia if not on wheels! Angela worked at a refugee camp in northern Norway where they received 267 people per day, with only 650 beds available, where they would be held for at least 72 hours. She talked about the challenges of language, capacity, weather, clothing, etc. The temperature ranged from -20 to -49 below. The refugees were families escaping war, ethnic cleansing, children travelling alone, women escaping sex slavery, and parents trying to save their daughters from sex slavery.

They transported families to different parts of Norway where they would begin their new life. They gave refugees integration courses which included learning Norwegian, social skills, and on the job training for three years. They do not expect families to give up their culture, but expect them to respect Norwegian values. She included stories of individuals that were memorable including a girl from Syria who was upset that she had a B in Norwegian Language class who is now following her dream of going to medical school. It was a very interesting presentation.
