
The Speaker for January 29th: Kim Walesh

As Deputy City Manager, Kim is responsible for Community and Economic Development, providing leadership and strategic coordination to city departments shaping the future growth and development of the city. She co-leads execution of the City s enterprise priorities focused on the transformation of Downtown San Joso, achieving the Cityos ambitious housing goals, and improving city facilitation of private development. As Director of Economic Development, Kim oversees City initiatives in business retention and attraction, workforce development, cultural affairs, and real estate. Prior to joining San Joso, Kim was co-founder and managing director of Collaborative Economics, and senior policy analyst at SRI International s Center for Economic Competitiveness. Kim is coauthor of the books Grassroots Leaders for a New Economy: How Civic Entrepreneurs Build Prosperous Communities and Civic Revolutionaries:

Igniting Passion for Change in American Communities. She holds a bachelor so degree in Economics and Humanities from Valparaiso University and a Master of Public Policy degree from Harvard University, where she was a Kennedy Fellow.

New Member Julia Casto



Casto was born and raised in Kittredge Colorado, the younger of two. After attending undergrad at Lewis and Clark College in Portland Oregon, Julia returned to Colorado to work at the Denver Art Museum. The work sparked her love of teaching as she worked with a wide range of kids and families teaching art and art history. After moving to San Jose on September 11, 2001, Julia entered Santa Clara University steaching program. Armed with her multiple subject credential she taught at Sunnyvale Middle School for 7 years. Despite first hand knowledge that babies will eventually turn into teenagers, very much like the kind she had spent 7 years teaching, Julia still had two daughters. After the second child was born she retired from teaching she became an artist. Shocked to find that art was not part of the regular school provided curriculum, Julia headed the volunteer art program at her daughters school for 7 years, ensuring that 800 students had access to art

making with a variety of materials. It was volunteering at the school where she became aware of the amount of food wasted by the students, and set her off on a new quest to work with San Jose School District to recover food instead of throwing it away.

The Meeting Summary for January 22, 2020

We were made aware that the PAWS Committee provided a waste station for residents with pets at Second Street Studios.

President Karyn thanked the Rotaplast Committee for welcoming all, then Red Badgers DOUG JAMES and CALVIN KEEN introduced themselves as they both handled the travelling microphones as visiting

Rotarians and guests made themselves known.

BONNIE BAMBURG again had the honor of engaging the Rotameter, the device that indicates the number of volunteer service hours which have been performed by our members locally and globally. To date, a total of 5,051 hours has been completed toward our goal of 8,000 hours for the Rotary year.

KATHLEEN THOMAS introduced CATHERINE VOSS-PLAXTON of San Jose State University shandshake program, encouraging Rotarians who havebusinesses to consider offering an internship through SJSU. Details available at:

It was wonderful to see Cyndie George return to the podium to provide an update about Rotaplast. She thanked our members for support and indicated that the next cleft palate mission will likely occur early next year in South America.



MATT MAHAN received his Blue Badge from President Karyn.

STEVE PROUTY and NANCI WILLIAMS encouraged all to register for the gala and thanked our sponsors. We currently have raised \$110,000 in sponsorships toward a goal of \$150,000. Sponsorship opportunities are still available, and the Gala Committee is still seeking unique auction items.

DEIMA ELNATOUR was fined by President Karyn, not because she was pictured attending a Rotary Club of London meeting without wearing her Rotary pin, but rather because an image shown of her cat did not depict the cat wearing a Rotary pin! What a *catastrophic* event. The good sport that she is, Deima added to the fine and contributed another \$100 to the permanent endowment in memory of her late mother.

TOM FANDRE and RON ZRAICK made a pitch for Job Shadow Day, taking place February 26. The participating companies were acknowledged, whose involvement will benefit youth from San Jose Job Corps and Pivotal during their respective on-the-job experiences.



President Karyn reminded us that the Rotary International Convention takes place June 6 through 10 in Hawaii, and also that throughout the year a contribution will be made to San Jose Jazz in honor of our speakers This led into ARTHUR JUE s introduction of this week speaker, Rajiv Nagaich, who manages AgingOptions, an

organization dedicated to educating the public about comprehensive and multi-disciplinary life planning solutions that can help everyone age in place, protect assets, and not become a burden to others. Information about this topic is available at: www.agingoptions.com, but the following are some highlights of today simportant and interesting presentation:

Life Planning is retirement planning reimagined. People want to retire for a variety of reasons, including having more free time, travelling, spend more time with family, etc. These folks worry

about institutional care, becoming a burden, running out of money, and family feuds. The majority will do well with their hopes, but 70 percent of Americans will not live out their lives in their own

homes; 69 percent will become incapacitated. This, said our speaker, is a predictable journey. The day that you fall ill is the day that your family is stuck in your life, said our speaker. As to health care planning, our speaker made the case that we should focus on how not to fall ill. He also emphasized the importance of being sure family members are on the same page as to your wishes, and offered a blueprint for a better plan, including health (preventative care), housing (predictability of outcome), finance (protection and use of money), legal (manual of instructions). The system is not broken; the information is broken.



President Karyn thanked our speaker and rang the bell at 1:15 p.m. to adjourn the meeting.
