## The Speaker for October 30: Quentin Kopp



## Life of the Independent

Retired California Superior Court Judge Quentin L. Kopp was born in Syracuse, New York and graduated from Dartmouth College in 1949 and Harvard Law School in 1952. From August 1952 until August 1954, he served in the United States Air Force, first in the Office of Special Investigation as a Second Lieutenant and thereafter as a First Lieutenant in the Judge Advocate General Corps, prosecuting and defending those accused of court?martial offenses. Upon discharge from the Air Force, Kopp became an Assistant Counsel to the Waterfront Commission of New York Harbor, responsible for elimination of racketeering on Manhattan, Brooklyn, Staten Island, and New Jersey piers

Admitted to the District of Columbia Bar in November 1952, the State Bar of California in January 1954, and New York State Bar in May 1955, Kopp was employed as an associate in a San Francisco's then largest law firm in December 1955, and opened his own office in San Francisco for the general practice of civil and criminal law on April 1, 1959. In November 1971, he was elected to the San Francisco Board of Supervisors and reelected in 1975, 1977, 1980, and 1984. In 1986, he was elected to the California State Senate as the first non?incumbent Independent since 1876, representing the western part of San Francisco and northern San Mateo County. Reelected in 1990 with 70% of the vote and again in 1994, Kopp became the first Independent reelected to the State Senate as an Independent in California's history. Click here to read more.



Past president BRIAN ADAMS then introduced our speaker, Craig Needham, a founding partner with the firm Needham Kepner and Fish, LLP. Born in Palo Alto, Craig graduated from Bellarmine College Prep, Santa Clara University, and Hastings College of the Law. A cycling enthusiast, Craig was training in San Francisco when, on July 6, he took a spill on his bike and suffered a severe concussion. He is recovering well and is thankful there were no further injuries.



As October 24 is World Polio Day, the timing of Craig's address was appropriate as he discussed polio from a very personal perspective. His mother, Jane Boyle Needham, was diagnosed with polio in 1949 at the age of 29 and she lived in an iron lung for 13 years, dying in 1962. In 1959, a book about her journey, which she dictated to Rosemary Taylor, was published under the title, Looking Up. For our meeting, Craig provided handout booklets about his mother's story so that Rotarians could follow along as he spoke and could also have as a take-away for reading at their leisure.

Despite being confined to an iron lung, Jane tried to provide as "normal" a home for Craig and his two sisters, who were on hand at today's program from Arizona, as they had never previously heard Craig's remarks, despite his having delivered them to about a

remarks, despite his having delivered them to about a dozen Rotary Clubs over the past few years. He referred to his mom as "the ultimate 'Mama Bear."



Craig's compelling and emotional remarks concluded with his heartfelt gratitude to Rotarians for the incredible success of the Polio Plus program that has resulted in the near complete eradication of polio worldwide. He said that he was here "to honor, salute, and thank Rotary."

Craig received a standing ovation from our Club, a rare experience for our speakers. As President Karyn had to depart prior to the conclusion of today's program, Brian Adams thanked Craig, presented him with our Club's challenge coin, pledged to make a gift to Polio Plus in honor of Craig, and at 12:15 p.m. rang the bell, adjourning the meeting in memory of Jane Boyle Needham and her family.
