





Fred Claire

"From Dodger Blue to City of Hope" Introducer: Phil Hawkey



Fred Claire was a member of the Los Angeles Dodgers' front office for 30 years, advancing from publicity director of the team to the position of Executive Vice President and general manager with responsibility for player personnel decisions and baseball operations.

In a distinguished career with the Dodgers, Claire served the team as a publicity director; vice president of public relations, promotions and marketing; Executive Vice President in charge of day-to-day operations; and Executive Vice President and general manager in charge of player personnel.

Claire joined the Dodgers in 1969 and proved to be an award-winning executive at every stage of his career. Claire was directing the team's marketing efforts when the Dodgers first hit the three-million mark in attendance and established a

period of record-setting attendance figures. He was instrumental in creating the branding of "Dodger Blue" and the subsequent "Think Blue" campaign.

In April of 1987, Claire was named general manager of the Dodgers and when

the team won the World Series in 1988 he was selected Major League Baseball's "Executive of the Year."

Since his departure from the Dodgers in June of 1998, Claire has maintained an active schedule as an educator, a founding partner and currently chairman of the sports analytics company Scoutables and as a contributor to MLB.com in addition to an on-going civic involvement. He is a member of the Rose Bowl Operating Company.

In 2017 Claire spearheaded the creation of the Fred Claire Celebrity Golf Classic, benefiting City of Hope in Duarte, CA.

Claire currently serves as a patient speaker for the City of Hope. The book Extra Innings chronicles Claire's journey to City of Hope with all net proceeds to the medical center.

One of his unique experiences was his daily transportation, which was riding the bus.


He was ending his work day on a crowded bus filled with a mix of people including some high school students and very young children. The high school students were playing some very loud-blasting profanity laced music.

Immediate Past President Scott Vandrick burst onto the scene at the University Club via the Pasadena Rotary Time Machine and found himself breathless and disoriented after a zip-zap-zoom through Pasadena Rotary's past, present, and future. "Are we in President Colleen's year? President Leah's year? President Jonathan's year?" After finding a Giants pennant behind the lectern he realized it was President Ken Joe's year and explained that President Ken is out of

town with his ailing mom. He sent out the Club's best wishes to **President Ken** and his family.



Past President Phil Miles, with his trusty guitar, led us in singing a chorus of Alice's Restaurant, a food-related song in honor of our food-related speaker, and This Land is Your Land. Fun fact: Those songs were written, respectively, by son-and-father duo Arlo and Woody Guthrie. Phil followed that up with the Pledge of

Allegiance.

Tammy Silver provided the Inspiration, from Eleanor Roosevelt: "Someone once asked me what I regarded as the three most important requirements for happiness. My answer was: 'A feeling that you have been honest with yourself and those around you; a feeling that you have done the best you could both in your personal



life and in your work; and the ability to love others.' But there is another basic requirement, and I can't understand now how I forgot it at the time: that is the feeling that you are, in some way, useful. Usefulness, whatever form it may take, is the price we should pay for the air we breathe and the food we eat and the privilege of being alive. And it is its own reward, as well, for it is the beginning of happiness, just as self-pity and withdrawal from the battle are the beginning of misery."

Of the options (visiting family and friends, traveling, live music and theatre, or sporting events), 55% chose visiting with family and friends: We have all been missing each other!

In the Department of Announcements Department, **IPP Scott** led off with a thank you to the amazing Zoom team. "You don't know what work goes into making these remote meetings work!" he exclaimed, thanking our crack team of **Frank Fish**, **Scott Carlson**, **Kat Rogers**, **Tammy Silver** and **Elisabeth Browne**.

IPP Scott then announced that we would have a challenge to raise \$1000 for the Polio Fund for World Polio Day, upcoming tomorrow, Saturday October 24. He invited people to put their pledges in the chat bar. **Scott** started with \$50 to put in a plug for Pasadena Symphony and Pops's new intimate concert series, Pasadena Presents, running from October 17 through November 14. IPP Scott then called on Past President Mary Lou Byrne, sporting her bright red End Polio Now t-shirt, who gave a presentation about presented about World Polio Day and the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, in which Rotary International partners with five other international

organizations. She invited Pasadena Rotarians to join San Marino Rotary Club for their Socially Distanced World Polio Day Walk on Saturday, October 24 from 4 to 6 p.m., beginning in the parking lot at Huntington Middle School, 1700 Huntington Drive in San Marino. Bring your leashed dog and your family, wear a mask, and enjoy a one-mile walk! There will be an ice cream truck and Polio Plus merchandise for sale, with all proceeds going to polio eradication. Mary Lou noted that if you can't make it in person, please join the World Polio Day 24-hour live Facebook webcast here, beginning tonight Oct 23 at 10 p.m.!

Past President Mary Lou also made a Polio Pig contribution of \$100 in honor of President Elect Cory Brendel and his fantastic performance in IPP Scott's Demotion, noting that in the heat of the moment she forgot to give Cory his much deserved "special prize" (a homemade trivet made of wine corks) on the day of, so she would be dropping it by his house that afternoon.

By this time the chat bar was fast and furious with Polio Pig pledges from our members! Read all about them elsewhere in this issue!

IPP Scott thanked Social Committee co-chairs **Debi Kroman** and **Stephen Smith** for organizing a great socially distanced brunch at the U Club last week, and showed some nice socially-distanced photos of the event.

Colleen Carey, on behalf of **JP Harris** and the Bikes for Christmas team, announced that we have fewer bikes than usual because Huffy is under great stress due to pandemic-related supply and demand issues, but we will get 150 bikes out of the 200 we asked for. Cathy Simms, on behalf of the International Projects Committee, invited everyone to the Festival of Life with our Rotarians in Chennai, India. Watch for an Pmail with the link to join in!

Pasadena In Five with Eric Duyshart

Eric Duyshart gave a report on the City of Pasadena, including these highlights:


- * COVID deaths are trending down in L.A. County and Pasadena, in contrast with 37 other states which are seeing increases and influencing local caution for reopening.
- * The City Council met recently to debate on a wide range of items including zoning restrictions, more affordable housing in the Civic Center, money for street repaving and replacement of water mains, and a new electric vehicle charging station at Glenarm. Next week the Council will consider how to appropriately recognize the late local legend Eddie Van Halen.
- * Last year Caltech developed the world's fastest camera, and recently they made it even faster, so fast that it can even capture light traveling in slow motion!
- * He highlighted local companies <u>Gigajot Technology</u>, <u>IDT Vision</u>, and <u>Ecliptic Enterprises</u>, all of which are bringing cutting-edge technology to Pasadena.

SPEAKER; ROGER CASTLE

Anne Miskey introduced our speaker, <u>Roger Castle</u> of the <u>Los Angeles</u> <u>Regional Food Bank</u>.







Roger said the food bank was founded in Pasadena in 1973 by someone who saw food going to waste and knew there was a better use for it. It moved to Los Angeles in 1989, at which time **Scott Jenkins** was

the president of its board and helped with the facility acquisition, and re-named L.A. Regional Food Bank. It is probably the largest supplier of food, last year donating 82 million pounds of food and 66 million meals. Roger says the food it handles is perfectly good and

is "timing out of the system" and will expire if not distributed to the needy. More than four million pounds of food per week are distributed through 600 plus agencies from hundreds of food sources.

With the pandemic there is a huge increase in need. L.A. County is "America's Hunger Capital." If it were a state it would be the 10th largest and has 2 million food insecure people, including not just homeless people but working poor who can't buy food or can't buy adequate nutritious food after paying rent and other necessary expenses.

Roger noted that L.A. Food Bank has 600-plus agency partners at more than 1,000 sites. For example, it has a grant from Tournament of Roses Foundation which it redistributes through the Pasadena area. Since the pandemic has hit, said Roger, "we have had to triple or quadruple the number of people fed by various agencies."

Says Roger: "We have a warehouse, logistic, trucking, 135 employees who pick up and sort the food and make it available for the agencies to order. We have our facility in South LA and

another one in Commerce. We are also a Key Emergency Responder in the event of a natural disaster. We have 30,000 volunteers per year, which is equal to 77 full time employees. Each volunteer hour is worth \$25. They are critical to maximum efficiency. Many business and community groups

use volunteering as a team building exercise - it's a self-contained event and requires no training."

Programs for children include a backpack program, after school meals, summer meals, and a mobile school pantry. Programs for seniors including Commodity Supplemental Food Program and Brown Bag.

In addition to feeding the hungry, L.A. Food Bank helps the environment: "We use food that would otherwise go to waste and reduce the carbon footprint."

COVID-19 response has been huge: "There has been increased unemployment and people don't have savings and there have been huge spikes in people needing food, many of whom have never needed assistance before. Food Bank distributions are up 145%. We did a distribution in Inglewood and people waited in a line of cars 5 miles long, for 1.5 - 2 hrs. We've seen donations rise again and now there is a farm-to-donation program so unsold food doesn't go to waste. We've been able to increase our distribution to about 900,000 people each month."

Roger explained, "unemployment peaked at over 20% and there was a big lag in people getting benefits, which contributed to the huge demand for food assistance. 1 in 4 households have experienced food insecurity in the pandemic so far."

What's next? "We are purchasing a new warehouse in City of Industry to replace our leased Commerce facility, and coincidentally **Scott Jenkins** helped with this, too. We will be able to give more food to more people so thank you **Scott** for helping us again in acquiring a building."

IPP Scott thanked Roger and then turned things over to Kat Rogers, who announced the Polio Pig total is at least \$2,200, blowing way past our \$1,000 goal! Scott said Mr. Polio Pig is very very happy that we had a call to action, and



we met it! At press time, the final total was \$2325. (Ed note: That will be

matched two-to-one by the Bill and Melinda Gates foundation for a grand total of \$6975 and what the heck - this reporter is kicking in the last \$25 to get us over \$7000!)

We went into our breakout groups and the topic was "tell the other members something they don't know about you." Kat Rogers led a lively Q&A that went into overtime with speaker Roger Castle.
