JUDGE DARRELL MAVIS "Art of Persuasion"

INTRODUCER: PP MARY LOU BYRNE



Judge Mavis has presided over 100 jury trials since his appointment to the Superior Court of California in 2006. For over a decade, he supervised 40 civil and criminal judges in the Pasadena, Burbank, Glendale, and Alhambra courthouses. He studied politics, philosophy and economics at Oxford University and received a Bachelor of Science in Economics from MIT and a Juris Doctor from Harvard Law School.

As a prosecutor for the Los Angeles County District Attorney for fourteen years, Judge Mavis tried over 100 jury trials. He prosecuted some of the District Attorney's most complex and high-profile cases including one of California's largest "no-body"

murder cases.

Judge Mavis regularly teaches and speaks to law students, lawyers, and judges at the California Center for Judicial Education and Research, Los Angeles Superior Court Judicial Education Seminars, the California State Bar, the B.E. Witkin Judicial College of California, and Harvard, Southwestern, UCLA, and USC Law Schools, as well as various

state and national bar associations. Topics include conducting a jury trial, criminal law, evidence, experts, trial skills, dispute resolution, ethics, persuasion, and civility. He has published articles on scientific evidence, criminal street gangs and consular notification.

In 2008, the Constitutional Rights Foundation awarded Judge Mavis "Judge of the Year."

He thanked **Cyrus Afshin** and the University Club for rolling with the punches and providing such a great takeout lunch for 40 of us despite the short notice of the Zoom meeting.

Our very special musical guest **Ross Jutsum**, Zooming in from the home of Sierra Madre Rotarians Tom and Julie Brady, led us in singing Everything's Coming Up Roses in honor of our guest Bob Miller of the Tournament of Roses. He followed that up with our National Anthem and the Pledge of Allegiance.



Past President Mary Lou Byrne did the inspiration, in the form of a courtwide email of encouragement she received from her colleague Judge Rupert Byrdsong on Monday as she was casting about for something fabulous to share. **You can see the full text below.

President Cory announced our Rotary Readers One Club, One Story will be postponed until the current COVID surge dies down. Therefore, the February book will be Susan Straight's **The Company of Women**, which is the City of Pasadena's One City, One Story selection. The meeting will be via Zoom at 6 p.m. on February 7th – details below.

On a more somber note, **President Cory** passed on the following from **Bill Opel**: longtime Monrovia Rotarian Herb Hezlep passed away on December 11. He was an <u>Arch Klumph</u> <u>Fellow</u>, which means he donated more than \$250,000 to the Rotary Foundation during his lifetime, and was also a leader in the Rotary Exchange Program. A memorial service will be held **TOMORROW**, Saturday January 8, at 11 a.m. at the Pasadena Presbyterian Church, 585 E. Colorado BI.



More sad news: Our longtime friend and Pasadena Rotary Director of Music, Ross Jutsum, has resigned from our Club after 42 wonderful years and is moving to Florida to be closer to his family. **Jan Moscaret** introduced **Ross**, saying: "He has fingers of magic and makes every keyboard sing! We thank you for all you've done, and we send our love."

Ross said he joined Pasadena Rotary 42 years ago next month. In 1975, after he graduated from the Royal College of Music in London, he came to Pasadena and had his first encounter with Rotary in 1976 when the late Past President Jack Bonholtzer's Demotion was held at Ambassador College, where **Ross** was chair of music department. He estimated that during his involvement with Pasadena Rotary, he probably provided music for 1500-1600 meetings of our Club! He also fondly reminisced about his involvement with Ambassador College, the Tournament of Roses, and Rotary, which involved playing for many luminaries and all kinds of funny stories ("I was there the day Bing Crosby fell off the stage!"). He also played at four Rotary International Conventions including Las Vegas, "somewhere in the 80s;" Munich in 1987; and Philadelphia, when his fellow Australian was International President, and he wrote a song for the occasion.

Ross and Tammy have sold their house in Sierra Madre (hence Zooming from their neighbors, the Bradys) and there will be an estate sale tomorrow from 9 to 4, and the last driveway concert will be on Sunday at 3 p.m. "I take requests, people bring folding chairs and food and drinks, social distancing is not a problem, and we have a good time for an hour or so." The address is in the Rotary directory – it's on S. Canon Ave. in Sierra Madre, only accessible from Orange Grove.

At this point there was nary a dry eye in the house(s on the Zoom), and Ross closed by saying, "The friendships we've made in Pasadena will stay with us and we'll be coming back! God be with you all, until we meet again!"

President Cory urged everyone to show up on Sunday and make it a Rotary social event! At that time, **Ross** will be receiving an appreciation plaque presented by**Cory**: With heartfelt appreciation, the Rotary Club of Pasadena recognizes, honors and thanks Ross F. Jutsum...." (If you want to hear the rest, you'll need to be there!) **President Cory** introduced our guest, Bob Miller, president of the Tournament of Roses for the past two years. "If there were an award for Mr. Pasadena, Bob would win it," said **Cory**. He was an instructor and administrator at PCC for many years and currently is a member of the PCC Foundation Board and Executive Committee. He was also on the board of the Los Angeles Community College District before retiring to helm the Tournament. And more than that, said Cory, "he's good to his mother."

Bob began by showing us a video of himself jumping out of an airplane to kick of the 2022 Rose Parade, followed by the introduction by Grand Marshall LeVar Burton, musical introduction by LeAnn Rimes, and of course the always-popular B-s flyover. So fun! His presentation was titled "Dreamed, Believed, Achieved," a play on the theme of the 2022 parade Dream, Believe, Achieve.



As we all know, the 2021 parade was cancelled, and the year was used to focus on reimagination, improvement, and planning. Bob and his team created reimagination teams including initiative for social justice and equity, TV special (reimagining the 2-hour broadcast), business development, community relations and membership, reimagining all the committee activities, and long-term budget and forecasting. As the pandemic wore on, they had to make sure public health and safety were the #1 priority, and also that the financial risk to the Tournament Association and all its partners was minimized. "Flexibility and patience were the watchwords," said Bob, "and they were joined by 'grace' toward the end."

Bob briefly recapped the decision, in conjunction with the USC Keck School of Medicine, to cancel the 2021 parade. Working closely with Keck School of Medicine and City of Pasadena Public Health Dept, it was subsequently determined the 2022 parade could go forward safely. They invited bands, equestrian units, 43 floats, and selected "an amazing Royal court." Of course, Bob emphasized, there were strict COVID protocols for members and participants.

There were two major themes to the 2022 parade: Celebration of education, and celebration of science/scientists/health care workers/first responders/essential workers. Bob said he really wanted to make sure bands, units, and floats were" very theme-relevant" this year.

The parade, the game, and post-parade Floatfest were all considered "mega events: for purposes of COVID protocols. TV Corner, the game, and Floatfest all required vaccination or negative test within 72 hours. Somehow, they collected more than 6,500 people's documents, of which 91% were vaccinated. And of course masks were required for all

patrons.

The Omicron surge required a lot of pivots at the end, said Bob, such as cancelling a lot of ancillary indoor events including the President's Ball. But, he said, "we focused on putting the parade down the street and the game on the field," and they did just that! Bob gave us the facts and figures on the parade: 43 amazing floats: 16 commercial, 16 non commercial, six self-built, five Tournament entries. "God is a charter member of ToR, and he/she delivered to us an amazing sunny day," Bob crowed.



10 high school bands, six college/university bands, four "other" including military bands and one made up entirely of band directors from all 50 states and Mexico. Unfortunately, all five international bands had to bow out due to COVID.

18 equestrian units from throughout So Cal and as far away as Hawaii.

LeVar Burton was a great choice for Grand Marshall this year, Bob said – he represents literacy because of Reading Rainbow, and people also have great memories of him from Roots and Star Trek.

Royal Court: "They were an incredible group representing the richness and diversity of our community from a cultural and racial standpoint," said Bob, and "it all happened naturally and organically through our process." They wore masks during the parade because it was a requirement of Pasadena Public Health. And, Bob noted, "I'm also proud to say six of the seven are from local public high schools!"

Finally, Bob showed a photo of him riding in the parade with his family on a vintage red fire engine: "I've had a thousand pinch-me moments through this two-year experience, but that was the greatest!"

And how did it all turn out? "Ratings this year for parade and game were stellar. People were highly complimentary. The whole purpose was to bring back a sense of normalcy, well-being, and celebration, and we did that. The crowds on street were smaller than usual but everyone was having an amazing time. On the football side, our Rose Bowl had 16.6 million viewers – equal to the BCS semi-final game, far eclipsing the other non-semi final games." Bob crowed, "We *are* the Granddaddy of them All -- the Rose Bowl is college football, and college football is the Rose Bowl!"

And with that, we were out of time!


