PROGRAM - J. Brooks - CPP Arabian Horse Ctr.

Most common breeds of horses have been heavily adapted through selective breeding and are quite different today from their original ancestors.

Arabian horses, on the other hand, have naturally evolved their impressive speed and endurance due to being subjected to the harsh environment of the desert.

Their noteworthy features include a shapely neck, big eyes on the sides of the head, large nostrils, a short back (even missing a vertebrate), and elegant movement that looks like they are floating more than running.

Earliest artwork depicting domesticated Arabian horses dates back to around 3,000 years ago and was even found in the tomb of Egyptian Royal Scribe Userhat in Luxor.

Arabian horses first left the Arabian peninsula in the 8th century during the Arab conquest of Spain. In the 11th through 13th century, crusaders brought them to Europe for use in battle.

The first attempt at breeding in Europe was done in the 16th century by Poland's king Sigismund II Augustus. In the 17th century, three horses were brought to England and became the foundation sires of the Thoroughbred breed. After this, the number of Arabian horses in Europe increased steadily. Both, Peter the Great of Russia and Napoleon Bonaparte of France, became enthusiast of the breed.

Breeding in America started in the 1760s and brought forth, for example, the Morgan, Quarter Horse, Standardbred, and American Saddlebred breeds. Arabian horses entered popular culture through the book series "The Black Stallion" that began publishing in 1941 and the movie with the same name released in 1979 and its sequel in 1983.

The W.K. Kellogg Arabian Horse Center at CalPoly

Pomona is dedicated to the breeding, sale, study, and promotion of these magnificent animals. It is the oldest and currently fifth-largest of its kind in the US.

The center was founded in 1925 by W.K. Kellogg who was born in 1860 and made his fortune with the Kellogg Corporation that he started after accidentally discovering corn flakes. During those days, the center was highly popular with Hollywood stars and Kellogg instituted the Sunday Shows to showcase the horses, which are still held today.

After serving as a Quartermaster depot for the US cavalry during World War II, the center was eventually donated to CalState Polytechnic College in San Louis Obispo. In 1966 the local campus separated and became CalPoly Pomona and was granted university status in 1972. The covenants of the deed included Kellogg's requests to, among others, continue the breeding of and education about Arabian horses, to only breed the best types, conformations, and bloodlines to the highest standards, and to have at least 24 affordable public exhibitions of the horses annually. Today, all of these covenants are still honored and many students are involved in the care for the horses and are in charge of putting on the Sunday Shows during the school months.
