measure placed on the November ballot by the Mt. SAC Board of Trustees. The bond measure is designed to address the need to:

- Upgrade learning environments that prepare students for transfer to 4-year colleges
- Repair deteriorating gas, electrical, and sewer lines
- Repair decaying walls, drainage systems, and leaky roofs
- Improve student safety
- Improve access for disabled students
- Expand vocational training programs
- Upgrade facilities for veterans to complete their education for workforce re-entry

 Like Measure RR in 2008, Measure GO costs

Like Measure RR in 2008, Measure GO costs taxpayers \$25 per \$100,000 assessed - not market - property value.

It's hard to believe that in 2018, Mt. SAC still has buildings that have lead paint and asbestos and outdated electrical systems that are prone to causing outages on campus. Repairing and upgrading infrastructure, like gas and electrical lines, are needed now since waiting will only cost more later. Some of Mt. SAC's buildings date back to the 1950s, 1960s, and 1970s and need to be retrofitted and upgraded. For example, the college art building has never been seismically retrofitted.


One of the core missions of Mt. SAC and the entire Community College System is to transfer students to four-year universities. Mt. SAC is the sixth largest transfer institution in the state, transferring about 2,200 students a year. By improving our resources and facilities, Mt. SAC better prepares students to move on and succeed.

Mt. SAC has high levels of demand for courses in Career Technical Education and STEM fields and students currently take classes in outdated buildings. For example, Mt. SAC offers chemistry classes on the weekend because it doesn't have enough space during the week. And, Mt. SAC recently started an engineering program but doesn't have the proper facilities. Instead, the students are using physics classrooms.

Lack of modern facilities are hindering students who want to pursue majors in those areas. If the college doesn't expand, the students won't be prepared to transfer.

Mt. SAC is a primary source for training firefighters, nurses, and other medical professionals and if you happen to be at Pomona Valley Hospital or Queen of the Valley, it's likely a Mt. SAC grad will be the health professional helping you.

Currently, Mt. SAC professors cannot lock their classroom doors from the inside in case of an active shooter and Mt. SAC doesn't have cameras in public areas in case of any crime. Measure GO will help fund the installation of cameras, lighting, and emergency communications systems so important in this day and age.





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
