Motor Classic News! Rotary Charities major fundraiser is the sale of tickets to Rotarians Over the past nine years Rotary Charities has had a program of selling 10 Motor Classic tickets to each Rotarian. Because of the favorable bulk purchase arrangement we had with the Motor Classic, Charities netted over \$22,450 in the recent 2018-19 year. This, combined with the distribution we will receive from the Motor Classic, will result in Rotary Charities having nearly \$120,000 for its 2019-20 year of charitable activities. This is truly amazing, and far exceeds anything we dreamed of as a benefit from our partnership with the Motor Classic. In fact, over its first nine years of involvement with the Motor Classic, Charities cumulative benefit from the Motor Classic partnership has been \$780,400. We are indeed fortunate to have this arrangement, as we re not aware of any other Rotary Club having such a successful fundraising program.

After nine years of having no increase in the \$25 base cost of a spectator ticket, the Motor Classic has raised the 2020 ticket price to \$30. As a result, the cost of 10 Motor Classic tickets would be \$300, an increase of \$50 over what Rotarians have been paying. The Charities and Club leadership is reluctant to pass on this increased cost to our members. Accordingly, after considering several options, the leadership will propose to the Charities and Club boards that we continue to bill our members \$63 a quarter • that is, no increase • but each member would receive 8 tickets instead of 10. This proposal will be reviewed by the boards. If there is any change, the membership will be notified promptly.

# Shody Chow has provided the following information from the International Projects Committee June 27, 2019 action points:

- Fund raising Laura Reinhart has provided a painting by Nieto Anton at a market price of \$1,500 to be used for fund raising for international projects. Will do raffle draw in September over several meetings to sell about 75 tickets at \$20 each.
- 2. India Water & Sanitation project this global grant project was initiated in 2015 and completed in 2017. The final report has not yet been approved by RI
- Cambodia Fish Tanks project project for \$3,500 to Community First approved and check sent. HMS Interact Club contributed \$1,000 to this water project. Await completion report.
- 5. Cambodia Coconut Plantation project project to fund water supply, fencing and planting coconut trees approved at \$2,375, and check sent to ODA. Await completion report.
- 6. Uganda School Water Collection and furniture project project for \$7,945 approved and check issued. Await completion report

- 7. Tijuana School Modernization project ♠ RC Tijuana Independencia ♠s new \$96K project is to improve the facilities of a high school. Draft proposal now online. Hopefully D5300 matching funds under new DFC Chehab El Awar will be available in July 2019. Have submitted proposal to SMR board and D5300.
- 8. Taiwan Rare Diseases project Woody Chen has provided information on this project.
- 9. Bicycles for Armenia Sebouh Bazikian of One Bicycle Foundation gave a presentation of his non-profit organization, and the bicycle program in Africa and Armenia. We may give an initial award for 10 bicycles for Armenia if funds are available, and will look at the possibility of working on a global grant project.
- 10. Reverse grant ♠ the PreK program is by Families Forward in Pasadena. Have consulted with RI whether such a project (\$40K) will be approved for a global grant. Will consult with D5300 whether matching grants could be available for the 2019/20 Rotary year. If the input is positive, then will write up a draft proposal and approach Rotary Clubs in Taiwan and Tijuana to be International Clubs for this project. May also approach Pasadena Rotary if more funds are required. Board has reserved \$5K
- 11. Budget for 2019/20 initial budget is \$16,000 from board including \$2K from Mead Fund. Will be used for Tijuana global grant project, Corazon House Build and other projects such as Cambodia Aquaponics, Taiwan Rare Diseases, Armenia bicycles and Uganda school.
- 12. Charlie Mead Fund � the fund will be reduced by the Charities board by about \$2,100 to about \$2,233.61.
- 13. San Marino Rotary website � will be updated from time to time.
- 14. Committee for 2019/20 ◆ JPM will be Chair of International Service. Co-Chairs for International Projects are Stephanie(Mexico), Andrew (Taiwan) and Shody(admin). Committee now at 19 members.
- 15. Next meetings the next International Projects committee meetings will be held on July 25, Aug. 29 and Sept. 12 at 1.30 pm. The dates will not conflict with SMR board meetings.





San Marino, passed away peacefully on Friday afternoon, June 21, 2019 with his family by his side. He was 91. McOueen was born to Sherman J. McOueen and Ethel Morrison in Monrovia, California, on May 29, 1928. McQueen landed his first job in commercial radio as a junior reporter at a Los Angeles radio station while still in high school. McQueen attended Monrovia-Arcadia-Duarte High School (MAD). This school had special meaning to McOueen because his father was the school's structural engineer. After high school and a year of Occidental College, McQueen joined the US Army where, while living in his Monrovia home, McQueen commuted to Sunset Blvd. and Gower St. in Hollywood. He worked the midnight to 8:00 a.m. shift to reach his fellow soldiers in the Pacific for Armed Forces Radio. He also covered stadium events in the Los Angeles area that were broadcast live over the AFRS. Returning to civilian life, McQueen attended Citrus College before working as a radio newscaster in Chicago and sportscaster in Spokane. McQueen left the talent side of show biz and assumed an executive management position in business affairs and drama development with CBS in Hollywood. He then went to D'Arcy Advertising in Los Angeles where he produced commercials and supervised all sports properties. He later joined Foote, Cone & Belding, at the time the largest advertising agency in the nation, as senior vice president and national broadcast director. During his thirty-six years with the firm, he served as executive producer of all client specials and series television shows including the Emmy Award-winning 'Hallmark Hall of Fame.' Upon his retirement in 1996, McQueen formed Highland Communications, a television production, marketing and public relations firm in San Marino, where he packaged and produced television properties for national advertisers and acted as public relations counsel for several Southern California community. philanthropic and cultural organizations. He was founding president of the Hollywood Radio & Television Society, cable committee chairman for the Television Academy and president of the Pacific Pioneer Broadcasters, which honored him with the Diamond Circle Award for his many contributions to the radio and television industries. McQueen was appointed telecommunications liaison between the City of San Marino and Time Warner Cable to develop Channel 19. He served as president of City Club in 1980 and on the community relations committees of the Huntington Library and Huntington Memorial Hospital. McQueen served as vice president and general manager of the Old Mill Foundation. While working with the Old Mill Foundation, McQueen was able to bring in summer concerts, and California Art Club art exhibits. He remained involved with the Old Mill until his retirement in 2010 and on the board until his passing. McOueen loved his work however as patriarch of the McQueen Clan, family always came first. He co-wrote a family history book and enjoyed visiting his Clan's native country of Scotland. He is survived by his wife, Ann of 51 years, daughters Amy (Jim) and Susan, granddaughters Sherryll and Bethany, and four greatgrandchildren. A private graveside service was held for the family at Live Oak Cemetery in Monrovia. A celebration of life will be held on Friday, August 16, 2019, 11am at San Marino Community Church.
