JP Mainguy, Bill Payne, Linda Wah and many others have made a significant impact on our club meetings; each week we have a stellar program speaker. We had 42 Rotarians in attendance this week (Sept 17th) to listen to Shelly Miles.

WHO KNEW that gaming and entertainment would be used as ways to help millennials and the z-generation learn about financial literacy. Shelly Miles talked about a lack of financial competence existing in these groups and cited several key points and reasons. When young adults are asked about finances they mention the following terms; boring, complicated, confusing, and taboo. Millennials and z-generation are not alone. It is difficult to know who to trust and how to learn. Shelly sees gaming, through E-Sports and entertainment through platforms like Millionstories.com, as ways to connect information about finances and entrepreneurship to young people. Shelly added, ◆Financial Literacy is not being taught at home or in school. ◆ She feels it is a moral imperative and mission to equip the next generation with the tools that they will need to make informed and responsible choices about money. By early 2021 we should see the release of the game Venture Valley, which is an extremely user friendly tool/game that allows people ages 13 on up to learn quickly about financial literacy, and about starting a business. The game goes from very simple start up businesses to more complex ventures. Thank you JP for bringing us another good program.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS from the desk of JP Mainguy:

Tijuana, Mexico (RI Global Grant GG1984610): Donated \$8,400 for the Jaime Sabines Junior High School Modernization project to improve the facilities of the school.

Soeng Sang, Thailand (RI Global Grant GG2011605): Donated \$5,250 for medical equipment for the Soeng Sang rural hospital: 2 patient monitors, 9 infusion pumps, and 1 pulse oximeter to a 60 bed hospital that serves 70,000 people in South Eastern Thailand.

Siem Reap, Cambodia: Donated \$15,000 to support ODA school teaching of English for disadvantaged communities in remote villages in the Siem Reap area.

Sen Sok, Cambodia: Donated \$3,700 to support Community First project to provide seed, fish fingerling and training to farm families in the Sen Sok area. Purchase a small motorcycle for Community First trainers to reach village families.

Tecate, Mexico: the committee is investigating the possibility of cooperating with Corazon and the South Pasadena Rotary club to build a family home near Tecate, Mexico

He is well versed in a broad range of legal and policy issues from farm to fork in local, national, and global food supply systems. He is actively involved in the development of food law and policy.

Michael has lectured on food-law subjects at law schools and conferences in a number of countries in Europe and Asia. He teaches two courses at UCLA Law: Introduction to Food Law and Policy (for second and third year law students) and Historical Perspective: The Role of Law in the Pursuit of a Moral Food System.

Michael is particularly interested in the global governance of food and recently led the Resnick Center into a partnership with the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) based in Rome, Italy on a series of research and advisory initiatives to confront global food security, nutrition, safety, and quality.
