For over 25 years Ron Sylvester has been producing/directing a wide range of video projects.

In 2004, Ron started his own publicity and production company, RS/tv Inc. and has been servicing his client base with broadcast publicity campaigns as well as corporate video, commercials, and online content.

The core of the RS/tv business is entertainment publicity. From theatrical premieres to home video publicity, as well as celebrity related consumer launch events, RS/tv Inc. has worked with every major Hollywood film studio as well as many big national consumer brands. The company also produces online entertainment content for IMDb.com at major events like Comic Con, Sundance Film Festival and The Toronto International Film Festival as well as Emmy, Oscar and Golden Globe coverage. In addition, RS/tv Inc. has managed the media logistic of the Primetime Emmys Red Carpet and backstage press center for the last 5 years

After graduating in 1985 from Clarion University with a BS in Communications, Ron began his career in NYC where he produced segments and special reports for a video trade publishing company.

From there, Ron entered the public relations field heading Edelman PR's broadcast division in New York City for 7 years as Senior Vice President of Production. During this time Ron created various video project for clients including VNR s and B-roll packages, live events as well as longer format shows, including a one-hour infomercial, sales videos, informational music video, instructional videos and PSA s.

Ron then moved to LA to continue his career in PR broadcast video. During a ten-year period, he has held various senior level positions with production companies and PR firms producing and directing additional live and taped productions.

IN MEMORIAM - SY ALBAN 1924-2022

How do you define a life well lived? Meaningful relationships? Career accomplishments? Community impact? Personal fulfillment?

No matter what index you use Seymour ♦Sy♦ Alban achieved success in every sphere of endeavor.

From his earliest life in Chicago, Sy exhibited impressive academic scholarship, concluding his Northwestern college career in 3 years and his Loyola medical studies in another 3 years. He joined the military and became a flight surgeon for the Army Air Corps, eventually retiring as a Reserve Colonel.

Following WWII he completed a residency in orthopedics and a fellowship in neurosurgery.

Sy and his wife, Reva, settled in Long Beach where he established a large orthopedic practice. He immediately became involved in the community serving as President of the Long Beach Medical Association and on the boards of the LB Heart Association, LB Symphony, St Mary Medical Center, CA Pools for the Handicapped, National Medical Veterans Society, CA Conference for Equality and Justice, and LB Transit, among many others. He joined Rotary in 1991 and remained a member until 2020 when failing health forced his

Sy 🍫 s extensive volunteerism included being a Reserve Deputy of the LA County Sheriff 🗞 Department. He flew search and rescue missions and repelled from helicopters to aid the injured. He was a founder and commander of the Doc Squad, a division of the LB Police Department Medical Corps. He also served as a Visiting Professor at Hadassah Hospital in Jerusalem and was an active member of Temple Israel in Long Beach.



He was an avid skier, tennis player, fly fisherman, boater and intrepid traveler.

He founded Alban Vineyards in San Luis Obispo, winning awards for its fine wines

Sy lovingly practiced medicine until the age of 94 when failing eyesight and diminished hearing led to his retirement. He leaves his wife of 67 years, 4 children and 4 grandchildren, all of whom expressed the extraordinary impact he had in their lives.

Sy Alban will be remembered as a kind, gentle and compassionate man who was the personification of a life well lived.

As in many past election years, Rotary members are candidates for local offices and many members will publicly support Rotarian and non-Rotarian candidates.

It is very important for every Rotarian to remember that the Rotary Club of Long Beach, per Rotary International policy, does not endorse any candidate for political office. As well, a Rotarian cannot list their affiliation with Rotary as part of their personal endorsement.

With elections on the horizon, it is important to leave politics at the door when it comes to Rotary. Active participation in local, state and federal governance is encouraged; however, whenever a member backs a candidate, please remember it must be personal endorsement without including a reference to Rotary.
