Why Talk About the Four-Way Test?

What is it?

The Four-Way Test is used by Rotarians around the world as a moral code for our personal & professional relationships. It was developed in 1932 by Herbert J. Taylor who took charge of a company in crisis. Taylor, who served as Rotary International President, credits the Four-Way Test with saving his company.

Why is it important now?

Pew Research Center reports that Americans & trust in our institutions and in each other is at an all-time low. We are in a crisis of trust. But you have joined members of 35,000 clubs worldwide who committed to the Four-Way Test: a standard that can help you be trustworthy

But it so not as easy as it may look. Our club so Teaching Education to Kids (TEK) committee delivered a 3-year ethics curriculum, based on the Four-Way Test. We knew the test by heart. But when we tried to create a lesson plan, we sat dumbfounded as we asked ourselves, what is fairness exactly? We started with, &Build Goodwill and Better Friendships, & where I shared my journey from loneliness to finding friends for life in our club. COLLABORATING TO END MALARIA Copperbelt Malaria Elimination Phase 2, Zambia

As you know, if you attended the September 23 club meeting, Copperbelt Malaria Elimination Phase 2 is the largest Rotary-led project to train, equip and deploy community health workers (CHWs) in their home villages of the most malaria endemic districts in Zambia s Copperbelt Province. The project is led by the Rotary Club of Seattle and the Rotary Club of Mufulira. At the Large Club Conference in February 2019, Long Beach committed \$10,000 along with others to support this effort. Along with RI, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation will match 1:1 dollars in this effort. This project will train, equip and deploy 1,055 critically needed CHWs into three districts where the 2019 average incidence of malaria was 225,724 reported cases in a population of 550,000. This project will:

- Reduce malaria in the target communities by 90% in three years.
- · Bring basic health care to the village level, enabling more immediate diagnosis and treatment.
- Reduce the burden on rural health centers and hospitals, particularly during and after the rainy seasons when malaria cases overwhelm their public staff.

The Global Grant was submitted in June to the Rotary Foundation. Because of the size of the grant, it was considered and approved by the Foundation/Trustees.
