Dr. Peter Kareiva, former Director of the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability at UCLA, became the CEO and President of the Aquarium of the Pacific, the fourth largest in the U.S., on August 1, 2020.

Kareiva has a wealth of experience and connections in conservation, research, fundraising, and management that will enable him to build upon the qualities that make the Aquarium a world-class institution, Board Chair Kathleen Eckert said in a statement.

Before coming to UCLA, Kareiva was the Chief Scientist and Vice President of The Nature Conservancy, where he was responsible for maintaining the quality of more than 600 staff engaged in conservation science in 36 countries around the world.

He studied political science and zoology at Duke University for his bachelor's degree and ecology and applied mathematics at Cornell University for his Ph.D. He is the author of more than 150 scientific publications and author or editor of eight books, including a textbook on conservation science.

Kareiva said in a statement that it is his love of the ocean that brought him to the local Aquarium. "There is no better place to share the wonders of the marine world with a diverse community, and no better platform from which to engage the global community in saving our oceans," he said.

Prior to joining The Nature Conservancy, Kareiva was the Director of Conservation Biology at the NOAA Northwest Fisheries Science Center, and before that he was a Professor at the University of Washington and Brown University.

His current research concerns the connection between humans and nature, and the varied ways people of different cultures value nature, as well as inequities in access to nature and decent environments. He is generally interested in the mix of individual behavior, corporate practices, and government regulations or incentives that will be most successful in conservation.

Kareiva has recently begun to do research on science communication, particularly with respect to climate science. In the past he has published on biotechnology, agriculture, risk assessment, climate change, invasive species, and the importance of getting our children into nature.

ROTARY SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION AWARDS NEWELL FAMILY SCHOLARSHIPS

The **Newell Family Scholarship** was established in 2012 by Rotary Past President **Frank Newell and his wife Margie**. Their vision was to provide an annual one-time reward (\$5,000 for CSULB and \$2,500 for LBCC) to outstanding students attending either Long Beach Poly or Wilson High Schools, who have overcome significant personal challenges and are a source of inspiration to others. Through their personal accomplishments and community service this year's recipients showcase the results of Margie's and Frank's shared vision.

This year both of the Newell Family Scholars graduated from Frank's alma mater "The Home of Scholars and Champions," Long Beach Poly. On November 18 at our weekly meeting, Rotarians met these outstanding young women. In addition to receiving this award, Alanis and Grace were also selected to receive Long Beach Rotary Traditional Scholarships.

Alanis Kristin Alvarez is a LB Poly graduate in the rigorous PACE program that challenges individuals to excel and offers advanced college placement courses. Alanis graduated with a GPA of 3.73 and is attending CSULB majoring in pre-med with the dream of becoming a doctor and hopefully returning to work at Long Beach Memorial Hospital. Early in life she learned that her mother had an incurable auto-immune disease. That challenge has driven Alanis down a path of taking on her mother's responsibilities at home while working toward a career in medicine. She is an inspiration to us all.

Grace Dulce Hughes Johnson graduated from the Poly Pace program with a GPA of 4.07 and is now a Journalism major at LBCC. In addition to being an outstanding student, Grace is a fierce competitor. From the moment her parents brought her home from Guatemalan foster care, she was on the move. It's no wonder this granddaughter of a marathon runner was both the most improved and most valuable runner on Poly's long-distance team plus the recipient of Poly's cross country Green & Gold 4-ever award. Sadly, when Grace was in first grade her mother passed away from cancer, and she has had to take on family home responsibilities but never lost sight of giving back to the community. Did You Know...

...how Rotary's emblem evolved

The Rotary wheel, unchanged since 1924, was redesigned many times in the early years of the organization.

A Rotary Club of Chicago emblem that featured a wagon wheel influenced early logos of other clubs and Rotary International.

Early club emblem

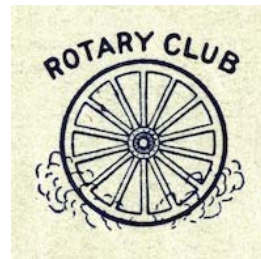
In 1905, Montague M. Bear, an engraver and member of the Rotary Club of Chicago, sketched a wagon wheel with 13 spokes as a club emblem. When fellow club members began to complain that the design was static and lifeless, Bear added flourishes that made the wheel appear to ride on a bed of clouds. Unfortunately, some members felt the clouds looked like dust, defying the laws of physics by being kicked up on both sides of the wheel. Bear responded by superimposing a banner with the words **Rotary Club** over the clouds.

Early association emblem

In 1911, Secretary Chesley R. Perry recommended that action be taken by the National Association to establish the wheel as the basic part of the emblem of every Rotary club. Clubs were invited to submit designs to an emblem committee before the 1912 convention in Duluth, Minnesota.

The Duluth convention provided some definition. The emblem consists of the basic principle of a wheel with gears cut on the outer edge. ... The spokes are to be so designed as to indicate strength; the object of the gears, or cogs, being two-fold: First to relieve the plainness of the design, and Second, to symbolize power.

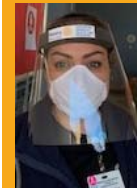


Our Rotary Family...
