During her tenure with ChildNet, Ms. Hughes has been an integral part of the growth and expansion of the organization. She possesses excellent leadership skills and has been instrumental in policy development and program implementation.

THE MOUSE THAT ROARED & BLACK HISTORY MONTH

In the late 1970 s, the eight-member Rotary Club of Duarte, CA granted active membership to three women, violating Rotary International s constitution. RI s Board of Directors soon revoked the Club scharter, and a decade-long legal battle ensued. The Duarte Club sued Rotary International claiming that RI s rule disallowing women violated the Unruh Act, California s basic civil rights law. RI claimed that Rotarians had, under the First Amendment of

the Constitution, the right of free association. The United States Supreme Court in Rotary Int'l v. Rotary Club of Duarte ruled that RI could not disallow women. The Court recognized that Rotary Clubs, like similar organizations, perform useful and important community services. It also found that at that time, women made up a large portion of the workforce. More than that, Rotary Clubs are business associations and California statute appropriately protects against discrimination against women, especially so that women could have access to a group devoted in some respect to information and sharing about business.

While it s amazing that it took until 1987 for Rotary to allow women, a tiny Rotary Club located at the intersection of the 605 and 210 freeways (where nothing ever happens) made all the difference. Today, RI is one of the most diverse organizations in the world, with clubs in every corner of the world. RI\sigmas sepressed policy is to be open and inclusive, fair to all, building goodwill for all of our communities. This is smart. Communities are always changing and failure to diversify would mean declining relevance and membership. Even more so, instituting such a policy is the right thing to do.

I am proud to belong to the RCLB. Our Club quickly reacted in 1987 and immediately inducted women into our Club. Women have taken leadership roles for decades. We are a much better club because we better reflect our community. Women have bought new energy and priorities to our Club. It is not an exaggeration to say that women saved the RCLB.

I know that every member supports our efforts to better reflect our community. Since its founding, the RCLB has worked to support underserved communities in Long Beach, providing scholarships, supporting students and families at Christmas. We recently have supported drives for food insecure students at LBCC and CSULB. Our work has made our







APPLICATIONS FOR ROTARY PEACE FELLOWSHIPS NOW OPEN

What a great opportunity for the right, focused young professional! This Fellowship covers tuition and living expenses for 130 fellows selected every year globally in a competitive process.

The goal is to increase the capacity of existing leaders to prevent and resolve conflict. They�re provided academic training, field experience, and professional networking, Fellows will earn a master�s degree or a certificate in peace and development studies at one of seven Rotary Peace Centers, located at leading universities around the world. There are already 1,400 program alumni working in more than 115 countries as leaders in a variety of organizations, education, research and law enforcement



Qualified candidates must have three years of related work experience for the master so program. They also need to have a bachelor so degree and demonstrate leadership skills. Applications for the 2022-23 academic term need to be submitted by May 15, 2021.

Did You Know... RCLB President #58, Jim Willingham

That is what Jim Willingham (Uncle Jim to me growing up) was. He called me Cammie, one of only three people ever to call me that (all Rotarians -Jim, Marvin Cloyd and Bob Maxson) ♦ maybe a ♦ Southern♦ thing♦

At 18, when I had a budget and a wish list for a car that no doubt exceeded that, he helped me select my first car, and ensured that it was just

What stands out the most is the way he made you feel. When he saw anyone, his focus was on them, How are you? How are your folks? What s new? This held true up to the last time I saw him when Brad, Jim, Betty and I sat together at Tom Ramsey's Memorial in 2019. His interest and questions were still about anyone who came to the table to say hello. He was a magnet. It was a treasured lesson to watch him in action.

HOW IT BEGAN...

It strue that many times in our lives it st the misfortune, the happening at the time, that seems insurmountable, even tragic. It st that time that we can look back and say � it was the best thing that could have happened to me. Our RCLB 58th President said that � an ankle broken while playing football • was a blessing in disguise.

President Jim was a P.K. • preacher • s kid. Born in Risco, Missouri, he graduated from Ada, OK High School after some 18 different homes as his father moved from pastorage to pastorage on ot an unusual experience for a preacher skid. It was this experience that taught him to meet all kinds of people ♦ to give him a head start as a salesman. After service as an aerial gunner in the US Marines, Jim played football, on a scholarship, at Missouri ♦ including the Gator Bowl Game in 1949. But the following football season, he broke his ankle playing Colorado and started his CA experience by hitchhiking here with \$60 in his pockets. He majored in petroleum geology in college but found his first job selling



But the salesmanship he learned in his youth lead him to a field more to his liking ♦ automobiles ♦ joining a Studebaker agency in 1950 -

from used cars, to new cars, to assistant sales manager, to new car sales manager.

In 1960 he bought into and changed the name to Boulevard Buick � one of the largest automobile agencies and largest Buick service departments west of the Mississippi.

In the automobile business, he was a legend.
