ANINDO began her musical and dance career in her homeland of Kenya, as a vocalist/dancer/percussionist. She enjoyed a successful solo career in Europe, as a vocalist, signing a recording contract with EMI Spain, and becoming known as Kenya's singing sensation. Anindo has performed with **Babatunde Olatunji**, **Mickey Hart of the Grateful Dead**, among others.

While in Kenya as a young dance student in ballet, modern, jazz and African, she met **Saundra Barnes**, a Dunham dancer living in Kenya and teaching Dunham Technique. Anindo studied with **Ms Barnes** (Ife) and in 1983 moved to the USA continuing her study of the Technique with Miss Dunham, and Dunham Masters like: **Pearl Reynolds, Archie Savage, Lucille Ellis, Tommy Gomez, Tally Beatty, Vanove Aikens, Theo Jamison, Ronald Marshall and Keith Williams.**

Dunham Technique is a technique created by Katherine Dunham. It is a combination of dance disciplines - ballet, jazz, modern, cultural dances from Cuba, Brazil, Haiti, Africa etc.

Today Ms. Marshall is a *Certified Dunham Technique Instructor*, and serves as a board member of the Katherine Dunham Certification Board. She has taught and continues to teach all worldwide, including *Debbie Allen Dance Academy, Dance Dimensions, Lula Washington Dance Theater, USC, Occidental College, LMU, LACHSA and ACTA.* Anindo also conducts residencies in colleges throughout the US. She also conducted Dunham Technique residencies in LAUSD schools as part of the *Arts Community Partnership Network*.

Anindo is also an accomplished musician, percussionist and a dance teacher of African dance from East, South, Central and West Africa.. She has studied with the world's finest percussionists, **Babatude Olatunji**, **Mamadi Keita**, **Mor Thiam**, **Lamin Dido Camara and Karamba Diabate** to mention a few. Her study of African rhythms made her continue studying West African dance as well under the umbrella of such teachers as **Kimoko Samo (formerly artistic director of Les Ballet African of Guinea W. Africa)**, **Marie Basse** and countless other great African dance teachers. She teaches percussion from Africa and Latin America and private vocal and piano classes to children across the globe. Ms Marshall is the Founder/Artistic Director of **MARSHALL DANCE COMPANY**, a dance company that focuses on Dunham Technique

(www.marshalldancecompany.org) and is the umbrella that raises funds for Abukutsa Arts Academy, a Performing Arts and Academic School, to be built in Luanda, Kenya.

WHAT IF ROTARY WENT EXTINCT?

Service clubs in the United States, once the backbone of community life, have been in significant decline over the past three decades, as much as a 60% decline since 1975. U.S. Rotary Membership was more than 400,000 in 1995. It s 330,000 today and only 10% of the members are under 40. Our RCLB has not escaped from declining membership. Trend lines over time show that in the year 2000 we had 400 members. Today we are at 266 members.

Why? Social commentators note that the U.S. has fewer people attending any sort of meetings, including professional associations, churches and other fellowship activities. The family dinner is a thing of the past. Societal pressures like the impact of social media, membership costs, increased time commitments, and lesser ties to communities all contribute to declining participation in community life.

Were you at last week s meeting to see Tatiana and Alicia awarded the Mark Bixby Leadership Award? Have you traveled to Camp Enterprise to work with high school students? Or have you been involved in our reading program? Or an International Program? Have you traveled to Caborca or Navajo Country with your fellow Rotarians? Have you participated in the Feeding the Future Program? Did you come to LBCC or CSULB to contribute food to fast-declining food pantries? Did you donate socks? These are unique programs to the RCLB. These and a long list of other activities contribute to the success of our community, particularly to those in need of help. These programs are possible because our Club is proactive and strong. But, what if the RCLB went away? What if we didn to we the resources to help?

The RCLB responded to the call of the pandemic. We reinforced our friendships with phone trees, virtual meetings, the car

In the Spotlight... Cup of Kindness 2021

In Long Beach, like many communities across the globe, Rotarians stand out as contributors to the success of the community. Whether in reading programs, taking high schoolers to camp, or generally making contributions to local charities, Rotary leads the way.

Each year, the president of the Rotary Club of Long Beach has the honor of selecting a recipient of the Cup of Kindness Award, which is presented to The Cup of our community who have made notable contributions to others without thought of reward, personal gain or recognition. The Cup of Kindness is a tradition introduced in 1966 by Odie Wright, LBUSD Superintendent and past president of the Club, 1962-1963.



This year s recipient of the Cup of Kindness is Bob Latimer for his notable contributions to our community this vear and over a long history.

Robert Whitney Latimer was born in Memphis, Tennessee and graduated from Washington and Lee University. He served as an officer in the U.S. Navy, and was recently awarded several medals in a ceremony on the USS Iowa in recognition of his service. We are grateful for his service to our nation.

While he was stationed in Long Beach, Bob married his sweetheart, Nancy, and they have been married for 65 years.

Bob founded his accounting practice in his garage, and then based it in Huntington Park. He recently retired after 65 tax seasons.

Bobos Rotary service goes back to 1957 when he joined the Huntington Park Rotary Club. He is now a 65-year Rotarian with the longest combined standing in our Club.

Bob was the president of Huntington Park Rotary in 1972 -- and many years later, when that Club disbanded, Bob was instrumental in the decision to move the \$100,000 balance of reserves from that Club to the Long Beach Rotary Scholarship Foundation. Many deserving LBCC and CSULB students benefit from Bob s role in making that contribution possible.

His family has a legacy of service. His father-in-law was a past president of Huntington Park Rotary, his grandfather-in-law, Horace Green was a Long Beach Rotarian, and Bobos son, Whit, is a current member and past president of the Rotary Club of Long Beach.

Bob epitomizes the 4-Way Test and exemplifies Service Above Self. Quietly philanthropic, Bob and Nancy recently established a Long Beach Rotary Scholarship Foundation fund in their names.

Many local organizations have benefitted from Bobos involvement, including the Long Beach Day Nursery and Long Beach Boy Scouts where his two sons, Whit and Mark were active. He has also supported the Long Beach Public Library Foundation, Mark Bixby Village at Camp Oaks, The Long Beach Women los Shelter, The Long Beach Boys and Girls Club, Supervisor Knabelos Safe Surrender Program, Children Today, Special Olympics Southern California, Opportunity Schools, Long Beach Blast, Pathways to Independence, and the Mark Bixby Leadership Award Fund, all through his board service with the Larry and Helen Hoag Foundation.

Bobles family nickname is appropriately, The Chairmane with five grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

We all are grateful to Bob Latimer for making our community a better place and congratulate him on receiving the 2021 Rotary Club of Long Beach Cup of Kindness Award.

Launch of Copperbelt Malaria Elimination Phase 2

Message from Jim Moore, Rotary Club of Seattle - Malaria Partners International

Late last year, the **RCLB contributed \$9,900 to The Rotary Foundation for Copperbelt Malaria Elimination Phase 2**. After TRF § 5% administrative fee, the contribution to the project was \$9,429. **These funds were matched** with \$5,000 of District 5320 DDF, \$9,900 from the Bill and Melinda Gates malaria matching fund, and \$14,664 by TRF, **for a total of about \$39,000**. That total amount will train and equip about 40 community health workers and benefit about 20,000 Zambians in rural villages with early diagnosis and treatment of malaria, diarrhea, and

Copperbelt Malaria Elimination Phase 2 (Zambia) Update

May 17, 2021

Dear Rotarian Supporters of Copperbelt Malaria Elimination (GG2095385):

Wonderful news \diamond we \diamond ve launched! This Global Grant project which will train and equip 1,055 community health workers (CHWs) to provide malaria health care at the household level for 550,000 people in three districts of Zambia \diamond s Copperbelt Province was launched today in Mufulira, overcoming the many challenges and delays posed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Two seven-day sessions of 30 CHW trainees began Monday, May 17th, in adjacent classrooms assisted by Rotarians from the Mufulira Rotary Club and Project Manager, Ms Maudy Lwenje. The opening ceremonies were attended by dignitaries from all levels of government, the participating Rotary Clubs of Mufulira, Kalulushi and Luanshya, and Malaria Partners Zambia. Media coverage was provided by national and local TV/radio as well as newspapers. Photos below document this important milestone.



By late July, all 387 CHWs for Mufulira District will have been trained and deployed--first to the rural health posts closest to their villages for 6 weeks of supervised practice, and then to their home villages. After a five-week break for Zambia's national elections, training will continue with 255 CHWs in Kalulushi District, followed by 413 CHWs in Luanshya District. The current schedule calls for all 1,055 CHWs to be trained and equipped by the end of the 3rd week in December 2021.

Your Club's and District's support have made this life-saving and life-changing project possible! Every \$1,000 contributed was matched by TRF and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, as well as by District DDF in most cases. Thus, in most cases, every \$1,000 of club contributions became \$6,500 and will train and equip 7 CHWs for two years, protecting an average of 3,500 Zambians in rural villages where the burden of malaria has been the highest.

To Rotarians in each of the 27 clubs and 7 districts that supported Copperbelt 2, we thank you from the bottom of our hearts.
