He has also worked at Virgin Galactic, the XPRIZE Foundation, Brown University, the Futron Corporation, and the United Nations, among others. Each of these foundations are separate from the Rotary Club of Long Beach (RCLB), and each has its own hard-working board of directors, bylaws, and organizational structure.

Because it can be confusing, here is snapshot of the three foundations.

Long Beach Rotary Charitable Foundation

This Foundation is the organization which primarily focuses on grants to organizations in Long Beach which are involved in youth or education. This year, the Charitable Foundation focused on COVID related issues. It yearly supports our club s grants for Reading by Nine.

· Long Beach Rotary Scholarship Foundation

This Foundation has been financially supporting local youth attending Long Beach City College and California State University, Long Beach since 1929. Every year, Rotarians recruit, interview, and mentor hundreds of students. The Foundation is one of the top donors at both institutions annually.

Rotary International Foundation

At this week s meeting, we will honor Rotarians who have contributed to the RI Foundation and have become Paul Harris Fellows. The Rotary Foundation awards grants to promote peace, fight disease, provide clean water and sanitation, sustain mothers and children, improve education, and strengthen local economies. The Foundation is also a worldwide leader in the efforts to eradicate polio. The RCLB has received many of these grants for Feeding the Future and our work to dig water wells in Mozambique. For the 11th consecutive year, The Rotary Foundation has received the highest rating � four stars � from Charity Navigator, an independent evaluator of charities in the U.S., in recognition for demonstrating both strong financial health and commitment to accountability and transparency.



We are so close to knocking the terrible disease of polio off the face of the earth. COVID 19 threatens to cause a potential setback of 10 or more years in our fight by impeding efforts to deliver the life saving vaccine to those most in need. Costs estimated to provide personal protection equipment to those administering the lifesaving drops are estimated to be in the staggering billions of dollars.

We are assembling as our RCLB founders did ♦ only now in new ways. Just as Long Beach Rotarians have met for 103 years we are connecting in fellowship.
