Julia Y.C. Huang is the Founder and CEO of Intertrend, a multicultural creative agency at the intersection of emerging trends and the interaction between brands and consumers. Intertrend is known in the industry to create deeply resonant and exceptional consumer experiences for leading brands in automotive, financial services, retail, entertainment, pharmaceutical and telecom.

Taiwanese American-born, raised and educated in Japan and Taiwan, Huang went to grad school to study communications at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. After working in New York City and Los Angeles in product development and then in Mergers & Acquisitions, a chance opportunity led Huang to the field of communications and the founding of Intertrend in 1991.

As the CEO of Intertrend, Huang is responsible for managing two award-winning companies headquartered in Long Beach, California: Intertrend and Imprint, an incubator for new businesses. Known for her strong belief that diversity drives creativity, she is a constant contributor to industry thought-leadership content, events and academia. She was named by Avenue Magazine as one of the 500 most influential Asian Americans and in 2014, Julia was selected by the Fortune's Most Powerful Women Conference as one of the Top Ten Entrepreneurs in the U.S. Most recently, Julia was named the City National Bank Entrepreneur of the Year by the Long Beach Area Chamber of Commerce. Over the years, Intertrend is consistently selected as one of the 100 Top Female-Owned Businesses by the Los Angeles Business Journal.

Intertrend has won numerous industry awards including the American Advertising Award; the ANA Multicultural Excellence Award; the Gold Award for Creative Campaign of the Year from the Asian American Advertising Federation (3AF); and the Marketer of the Year Award from 3AF. In addition, Intertrend won the People's Choice for Exhibition of the Year at the Frame Magazine Awards and the Bronze Cube for Spatial Design at the ADC 99th Annual Awards, both for The Art of Bloom exhibition.

Many members already know Mary through her active civic engagement on boards and commissions, among them Long Beach Transit, For the Child, and the Citizens' Advisory Commission on Disabilities. We also know about Mary's important contributions as an elected Long Beach Councilmember.

Mary was born with the heart of a Rotarian. Being of service to others is the story of Mary's life, and she truly embodies Rotary's motto of "Service above Self." She is passionate about Rotary International's effort to eradicate Polio worldwide because, as a Polio survivor, she knows first-hand the long-term effects of the disease.

In 2012, Mary was crowned Ms. Wheelchair California, and she used her platform to promote personal independence for people with disabilities. She championed self-advocacy, higher education, and quality employment opportunities for people living with disabilities in California. Mary's passion for developing a stronger and more integrated disability community led her to establish the Professional Abilities Association of America, an organization created for working professionals with disabilities by other working, disabled professionals, focused on inclusion in the workforce.

I first met Mary in 2001 when she participated in Leadership Long Beach's Executive Quick Start program while I was that organization's Executive Director. At that time, Mary was working for St. Mary Medical Center as a Community Outreach Advocate. Right from the start, it was clear that Mary had the heart of a servant leader. She went on to participate in the 10-month Institute program and is a graduate of the 2015 Leadership Long Beach Class.

I had the pleasure of working even more closely with Mary when she was invited to serve as a Leader-in-Residence and Faculty Fellow for the Ukleja Center for Ethical Leadership at CSULB. From 2016-2019, Mary inspired hundreds of university students with her inspirational story of rising above every challenge that came her way.

Mary was elected to serve as Long Beach's 1st District City Councilmember in November 2019, becoming the first Latina wheelchair user to be elected to office in the nation. Community and family are at the center of Mary's life. Her strong work ethic is rooted by her parents, a field hand and a factory worker, who provided their children with a better life. Their hard work enabled Mary to become first in her family to graduate from college – from CSULB, of course!

We are so fortunate Mary has chosen to share her experience in leadership, organizational development, and community service with our Club. She will be an outstanding Rotarian and a wonderful addition to our Club.

While waiting for her mother, she noticed the children at the center who were also there to receive treatments. She noted their scared faces.

Giovanna asked many questions of the staff about what it was like for the children - they explained the process to her, and took her on a tour of the facility.

She decided to write a book for these children, a book to help them go through their radiation treatments. "A Kid's Guide to Radiation Therapy" - Despite the potentially-alarming subject matter, it's an absolutely charming publication.

In her eight concisely written chapters, she takes her young reader through a better understanding of what cancer is, what it is not, and lets them know what to expect in their treatment.

Above all, her book offers hope.

In her matter-of-fact writing style, she lets kids know that this is just a part of life; they just need to know how to navigate it.

Each page contains the written information in both English and Spanish.

And each page contains a delightful illustration, with many different animal characters participating in the experience: the patient is an adorable rabbit, the doctor is a panda bear, and the nurse an ostrich.

She makes the reader feel they are on a team, with these many wonderful helpers.

Giovanna saw a need in the community, and she filled that gap.

This was the hallmark of Mark Bixby's life, and why it makes her the perfect recipient of the Leadership Award that bears his name.
