Denatured ethanol is precisely the opposite of what Simon Haxton, our next Rotary Speaker, typically tries to craft on a day-to-day basis. Denaturing alcohol involves making it poisonous, foul-tasting, and outright awful. Add some hydrogen peroxide and glycerin and, well, there you have it: sanitizer that can be bottled and shipped.

♦You spend all this time taking the bad stuff out of the alcohol and then you have to put all the bad stuff right back in, ♦ Haxton told the Long Beach Post in March. Soul-crushing in one sense, life-saving on the other in these days and times.

As a co-owner and master distiller at Portuguese Bend, Simon was part of the team that recently opened the city s first distillery, a feat of approvals and hurdles itself, then not long after opening, the pandemic hit.

Simon quickly faced new challenges and opportunities to meet a great need during the crisis: mass production of hand sanitizer, hundreds of gallons each week. We l hear how Simon and his team made the shift and how they worked to meet an extraordinary need.


