Dr. Rashida Crutchfield is an Associate Professor in the School of Social Work at California State University, Long Beach. She earned a Master of Social Work at the Brown School of Social Work at Washington University in St. Louis and her Doctorate in Educational Leadership from CSULB. She worked for the National Conference for Community and Justice in Long Beach and the American Civil Liberties Union of Eastern Missouri before serving on the Covenant House California staff. Experience at this Los Angeles shelter for 18-to-24-year-olds experiencing homelessness gave her insight into practice, building rapport and intervention with this population's strengths, needs and perspectives.

Dr. Crutchfield has been a faculty member in the CSULB School of Social Work since 2007 as field faculty and lecturer. She began as an Assistant Professor in 2014 with a focus on practice and research in youth homelessness, access to higher education, social and economic development, and social work community practice. She was the Principal Investigator for Phase I of the CSU Chancellor study on food and housing security, and Co-Principal Investigator for Phases II and III. These studies are the largest of their kind.

Dianka Lohay, the Basic Needs Coordinator at Long Beach City College (LBCC), is a first generation American whose parents escaped communism in Czechoslovakia and immigrated to America for a better life. She was a non-traditional college student who started her educational journey after she became a single mother and is a proud product of the California Community College system. Upon graduating from Rio Hondo College with two associate degrees, she transferred to California State University Long Beach (CSULB) School of Social Work where she completed a Bachelor of Arts in Social Work (BASW) followed by a Master of Social Work (MSW) in Integrated Health. During her time as an undergraduate and graduate student, she worked for Dr. Rashida Crutchfield as a Research Assistant studying the experiences of students facing basic needs insecurity and contributed to the CSU System-Wide Study of Basic Needs. In her current role at LBCC, she routinely provides the services she once accessed as a college student herself, while applying a professional lens. She has a passion for education and ensuring that all students are equipped to reach their educational goals.



The RCLB Election Process

This Week, Ballot #2

WHAT TO EXPECT:

- This week you will receive Ballot #2 via email with the 14 names with the highest votes. Please call the
 office if you need a ballot by regular mail.
- Please cast your vote for ONLY 7 representatives who will select the future leadership of the RCLB and enter your badge number on the ballot.



3. Email your selection of 7 names to the Rotary office OR print your ballot, mark the 7 names, and mail to the Rotary office (400 Oceangate, Suite 470, Long Beach, CA 90802). Either way, ballots must be received by 1:30 p.m., Wednesday, October 14.

The fine print per the by-laws:

- Any ballots received after the deadline will be disqualified.
- Ballots with more than 7 votes, fewer than 7 votes, or more than 1 vote cast per candidate will be disqualified.

THE ELECTION COMMITTEE

Ballots will be counted by three members of the outgoing Election Committee.

The Election Committee serves for one year, Nov. 1 - Oct. 31. The most senior Past President, determined by year of presidency, shall serve as Chair. Should no Past President be elected to the Committee, the longest serving member of Rotary shall serve as Chair. The Chair may relinquish leadership to the next most qualified member. No person shall serve as Election Committee Chair more than twice in a six-year period.

Should any of the 7 elected members desire their name be included in the nominating process for President-designate, they will relinquish their position on the Committee. Any vacated position will then be filled with the Rotarian receiving the next highest votes from the membership.

The newly composed Election Committee (7 Rotarians), plus the President, Immediate Past President, President-elect, President-nominee and Club Administrator will meet to discuss eligible President-designate candidates and related matters. Only those seven members elected by the membership shall vote for the President-designate. Members of the Election Committee shall not be eligible to be elected as President-designate.

The Election Committee not only selects the President-designate but also approves the proposed directors and officers of the Club for the succeeding fiscal year. Notice of the results of the election of officers and directors by the Election Committee shall not be given to the members until the RCLB annual meeting, customarily the 2nd Wednesday in December, when the President-elect announces the future Board of Directors, concluding with the announcement of the President-designate.
