Vocational Speaker – Victoria Bentley

The meeting began with a Vocational Talk from Victoria. Victory shared how she first got involved in Rotary. Back in 2007 she was watching the news about women in the Congo. Guest Speaker – Mike Swize, Superintendent of PSUSD

Our guest speaker today was Mike Switz. By way of background, Mike obtained his bachelor's degree in history with an emphasis on Chicano Studies and Spanish from the University of Colorado, his master's in Education Administration from Azusa Pacific University and his doctorate in organizational leadership from the University of La Verne. He is a membership of numerous associations where he held many positions – and has achieved numerous awards throughout his career including several district awards for top administrator, principal and teacher between 1993 and 2013. Mike has worked in the school district for 32 years starting out in Desert Hot Springs.

Mike then talked about the structure of the school district, information on the student population, how they are handling Covid and the pandemic in general and what some of their priorities are.

This Weeks Program (Continued)

There is a five-member elected school board with 27 schools in the district serving the following desert cities: Palm Springs, Cathedral City, Desert Hot Springs, Rancho Mirage and 1000 Palms (for a total of 500 square miles). This would include 16 elementary schools, 5 middle schools, 4 comprehensive high schools and some alternative/hybrid schools in Cathedral City and Desert Hot Springs. There are 2600 staff members! When the requirement to be fully vaccinated came out they got 99.99% participation!!

One of the issues they are facing is declining enrollment – 2,200 fewer students since 2012 and 700 fewer just last year. The highest number came from the elementary school age children. They are trying to contact and reach out to these students as best they can. Adding to this is a declining birth rate in California. An interesting statistic is in the 1970's one in three people in California were children and they expect that to be one in five by 2030.

Mike spent some time going over several statistics regarding the student population. Some meaningful ones are: 80% of the students are Hispanic; 11% White and 5% African American

30% are learning English

97% are socioeconomically disadvantaged

10% are homeless or in foster care

The good news is that 91.1% graduate and over 51% go to college.

Mike shared mostly good news regarding the pandemic and Covid cases – active cases consist of only 7 students and 7 staff. Everyone must wear masks, they eat outside whenever possible, they have free testing everyday all day long and have put up plexiglass barriers where appropriate. They have been very open and transparent with the community and parents which Mike believes contributed to a high acceptance rate on mask wearing and testing.

Regarding priorities – they are focusing on equity and anti-racism. A question was asked about police on campus. This is not new – police have been in the high schools for 20 years. What is new now is the role they are playing. Instead of being there to arrest students, they are working in partnership with the administration and counselors to support the students – and not arrest them. Everyone appreciated Mike attending our meeting and sharing this information!

Afterwards Michelle did trivia questions (which most people got wrong!) Like how many pounds of candy corn is made (too many) and what were they called previously (chicken feed).
