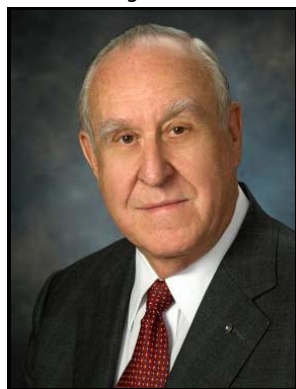

Set in lovely Eureka Springs, AR at the Best Western Inn of the Ozarks, the "DisCon21" will feature several guided opportunities for you to learn from fellow Rotarians, something that has been requested often in the past.



To "do it right" you need to start the weekend by attending the District 6110 Foundation Banquet on Friday

night. This event will honor Past District Governor Ed Hardesty and his wife Jeanette. Ed has been the District's "go-to" Foundation guru for several years. He has spoken at many club meetings about the Foundation and is always willing to help out with Foundation information.

Keynote speaker at the Foundation banquet, and then addressing us next day at DisCon21 will be Past Rotary International President John Germ. A Rotary member since 1976, Germ has served Rotary as vice president, director, Foundation trustee and vice chair, chair of Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, RI president's aide



and President of RI. He is a recipient of Rotary's Service Above Self Award and The Rotary

Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service. He and his wife, Judy, are members of the Arch Klumph Society. The son of a stonemason, who built the family home with his own hands, Germ developed his work ethic early in life. Nothing came easily. Other schoolboys made fun of his name ♦ ♦ they called me ♦ Bacteria ♦ ♦ ♦ and his parents couldn't afford college tuition. After a stint in vocational school, he paid his way through the University of Tennessee at Knoxville by working in a machine shop and serving food in a dorm cafeteria. After graduating, he joined the U.S. Air Force. Soon promoted to captain, he was navigator on a 50-ton Douglas C-124, ferrying troops and

tanks to Vietnam.

You will not want to miss his keynote on Friday, Sept 17.

The fun continues Saturday as DisCon21 gears up. John Germ will speak at the opening breakfast meeting, and continue to inspire all of us. Much of the day Saturday will provide guided opportunities to learn from other fellow Rotarians about all the elements of Rotary. Signature Project: The Iola - Kenya Project



The Iola Rotary Club is located almost 150 miles north of Tulsa, and is the northwestern-most club in the district. The city of 5,700 is the County seat of Allen County. They make Rotary happen there!

Dr. Luka Kapkiai, joined the Iola Rotary Club in May of 2014. He is originally from the Burnt Forest region of Kenya (about 50 miles east of Lake Victoria)

and teaches chemistry and physics at Neosho County Community College in Chanute, Kansas. His wife, Sarah, is a registered nurse and works for St. Luke's Health System.



When he joined, he made it known to the club that there was an acute need for medical equipment in rural clinics in the area he and his wife are from. Because of the Medical Supplies Network (MSNI) within District 6110 and after board discussion, it was decided our club would provide \$10,000 toward shipping a container of medical equipment. Efforts were made to secure import and non-tax authorization from the Kenya government. No progress to that end was made.



In 2015 Luka and his family made the trip to visit family. At that time we sent a few of the Sawyer Point One water filters with him. Then in 2017 another club member, Frances Kinzle, and her husband, Steve, traveled to Kenya to visit Luka and his family. With this visit, more water filters were taken.

The next year, 2018, Luka traveled by himself to have a business discussion with his family, and Steve Kinzle and Bob Hawk also made the trip. This time they took about 70 water filters with the goal of taking them to schools, as most schools do not have potable drinking water. They also ended up taking filters to 3 or 4 rural clinics

and seeing first hand the lack of any equipment. While there we met with the Senator from that area, hoping to secure authorization to import used medical equipment. No luck.

In 2019 Tom Brigham, club president, and Bob Hawk traveled to Kenya again along with Bob's grandson. Their main goal was to distribute water filters to schools. During that trip the population of schools visited would have been in excess of 6,000 students. They also made it a point to take

filters to the rural medical clinics. They met with a Member of Parliament and also the local health authority hoping to secure the authorization needed to ship the medical equipment. Again, no success.

Not to be discouraged, the club looked at what could be purchased in Kenya in the way of medical equipment. One of Luka's brothers visited three clinics to discuss their needs and to make a list. A wholesaler of medical equipment was located about 35 miles away and gave prices for the wish list. The total exceeded the funds available, so the clinics were asked to modify the list to those items they really needed. When this list was compiled, it was only slightly over the \$10,000 budgeted and the decision was made to wire transfer the money to Kenya to make the purchase happen. Luka and his family were making their every two year visit and would be available to facilitate the distribution.



The incoming 2021-2022 Iola Rotary president, Alana Kinzle (left), and Bob Hawk (right), decided to also make the trip to help the distribution. On the second day of her presidency, Alana was able to participate in the distribution to the Cengalo clinic. The clinic was constructed in 1997 and the beds from the Iola Rotary Club were the first ones in the clinic. In total the club members distributed to three clinics and the appreciation for what we had done was palpable.



Alana and Bob "attended" the Iola club meeting via Zoom while at the clinic! This equipment will make a huge difference in the lives of those living in the communities. As Bob Hawk noted, "Previous to having the beds and birthing equipment, a new mother would be sent home within two hours. To us, that is unimaginable and for them it should be unimaginable as well."

In addition to water and medical equipment a chicken project was begun. James, (right), one of the chick recipients, sent this photo. These eggs and his ability to sell them to generate income are the ultimate goal of the project.

The club has made several TV appearances on area stations, and many newspaper articles from their continued Kenya connection.

The Iola club also has had assistance from other Rotary Clubs. The Garnett, KS, Rotary Club, some 30 miles from Iola, (but in District 5710) provided \$500 towards the water filter project. The Coffeyville Schools have helped with funds, among others.



With about 50 members, including two Past District Governors, the club also keeps quite busy with several local projects, including Rotary Day in the Park, High School Achievement Awards (they've done that for 97 years!), SAFE BASE project, Grocery



Grab, and the Westervelt Memorial Car Show/the Smokin' Hot Car and BBQ project. But the Kenya Project is the one that showcases the Iola Rotary Club's international connections.

WHAT'S THIS ALL ABOUT? The Iola Rotary Club demonstrates that hard work, perseverance, and "getting everyone involved" make a Rotary Club work. You don't have to be an extremely large club to really make a difference!

Rotary 101 - August 2021

This month's installment:*

The Many Sides of Rotary

When we say "Rotary" we usually think about our own local club, right? While Rotary is comprised of about 35,000 clubs, there are more interesting little sides to Rotary. Here in our district we would have as many sides as an [Octacontagon](#) - and that's just in our district! Each of our clubs belong to Rotary International, and RI has many, many sides to it.

Many facets of Rotary are bigger than the club, and even bigger than the District. Let's take a look at some of the many sides of Rotary - and uncover the crazy acronyms they use.

As Governor Kevin has noted in a recent "It's Monday" email, there are more than 90 [Rotary "Fellowships"](#) - a way to find Rotary friends who also appreciate wine, RVs or Amateur Radio, photography, etc.

[RAG or Rotarian Action Groups](#) help Rotary clubs and districts plan and implement large-scale projects in their area of expertise - like the WASHRAG - Water and Sanitation Rotarian Action Group.

Here are some other sides to Rotary - your club may have had a connection to them...or not (yet)

[Rotaract](#) originally began as a youth program in 1968, Rotaract clubs bring together people ages 18 and older to exchange ideas with leaders in the community, develop leadership and professional

skills, and have fun through service. With almost 11,000 clubs world wide, there are seven Rotaract clubs in our district. Rotaract is an official program of Rotary International, and members can be members of both Rotaract and Rotary at the same time.



Interact clubs bring together young people ages 12-18 to develop leadership skills while discovering the power of Service Above Self. With about 15,000 clubs worldwide, there are 38 clubs in our district. It is an official Rotary International program.

EarlyAct - a school-wide service club for elementary students from ages 5 to 13 sponsored by Rotary Clubs and chartered by the district. It is not an official program of Rotary International - yet! The Tulsa North Rotary Club chartered the first EarlyAct club in the District last year. EarlyAct is based upon the Rotary 4-Way Test and further, EarlyAct teaches Caring, Respect, Empathy, Responsibility, Tolerance, Citizenship, Compassion, Friendship and Leadership.



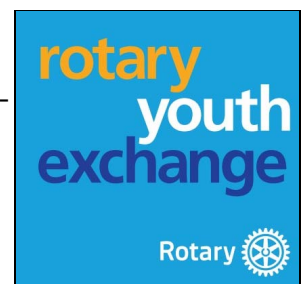
Inner Wheel - an international organisation closely linked to Rotary that was founded in 1924 by Margarete Golding, a nurse, business woman and the wife of a British Rotarian, to unite wives and daughters of Rotarians (who were not yet allowed to join Rotary themselves). There are almost 4,000 Inner Wheel clubs, with 35 in the USA. *Bet you didn't know that one!* (the 2018 Council on Legislation requested the RI Board to consider allowing Inner Wheel to maintain a web page on Rotary.org)

RYLA - Rotary Youth Leadership Awards - an intensive leadership experience organized by Rotary clubs and districts where you develop your skills as a leader while having fun and making connections. Fingers are crossed for the District's RYLA camp to take place in the spring.



RCC - Rotary Community Corps is a group of **non**-Rotarians who share our commitment to changing the world through service project. There are more than 10,000 RCCs, tho only about 300 are located in the USA and Europe. 77% are in South/Southeast Asia and Oceania

Rotary Youth Exchange - a study-abroad opportunity for young people who spend anywhere from a few weeks to a full year as an international student hosted by local Rotary clubs. The program is on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic.



Rotex - a society of past Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) alumni that engages with current Inbounds and Outbounds to better their exchange experience overall.

RI Convention - takes place annually and welcomes all members and their families. It's generally held in a different world city each year and is attended by 20,000 to 40,000 people. 2020's and 2021's conventions became virtual due to COVID-19 but 2022 is set for June 4-8 in Houston TX, followed by Melbourne, Australia in 2023.
