Rotary's program year begins July first. Each year we transition to new leadership in clubs, at the District, and at Rotary International. Some clubs hold a formal installation banquet with PowerPoint presentations of the prior year's accomplishments and a solemn installation ceremony. Others just hand the gavel to the new President and say "good luck!" Either way, we're off to a great new Rotary year!

As with any new beginning, it is a time to set goals, gather a



new leadership team, and begin anew doing good in the world. District Governor Kevin has asked that all clubs set goals for

their club. Only by setting a goal can you plan for your activities, and work to meet the goal. Does your club enter its goals (Foundation giving, membership, projects, etc.) on the Rotary Website in the Rotary Club Central? It's easy to do, and helps you track your progress. Ask your Assistant Governor if you need help!

Each new Rotary year brings a new Presidential theme - this year is "Serve to Change Lives" (see below). Many clubs hang a banner of the current year's Presidential theme in their meeting place. 
District Conference and Foundation Banquet Set for September

Signature Project: Bartlesville Daybreak's Fantasy Land of Lights

Many Rotary clubs have a "Signature Project" that is well known in the area and provides a significant service in the community.

Fantasy Land of Lights is an annual, drive-through Christmas light display at Johnstone Park in

Bartlesville, OK that has become a holiday tradition and is the premiere project of Bartlesville's Daybreak Rotary. With the help of generous donations from the public, Fantasy Land of Lights continues to grow each year. The signature project takes the work of all of their members in the weeks between mid-October and mid-November to set-up the displays. Summer isnot a down time as they have used the off season to go completely to LED lights in 2017 and to repair the displays (primarily re-taping lights onto the steel)!

The club involves several partners in the project:

- The City of Bartlesville allows the park to be closed to traffic from October to January to allow the display.
- The Bartlesville High School Soccer Team is critical to their success as they help load in and load out the display



- The Gingerbread House is manned by dedicated volunteers from Bartlesville November 20 -December 30, every year to collect donations and handout candy canes (donated by the local credit union) and dog biscuits.
- Volunteers may be Rotarians, and many times they are community groups looking to give back during the holiday season. It takes a village to make Fantasy Land happen.



This signature project began with a very small committee of just four people; Judy Duvall, Doug Lynch, Randy Weatherly and Gretchen Winger. They took care of the placement of the displays, the purchase of new displays and bulbs for the displays as well as advertising and organizing the volunteers. The first year that Daybreak Rotary began sponsoring Fantasyland was a challenging year. It was 2002, and after September 11, 2001 the city had placed red, white and blue bulbs in all of the displays for that Christmas Season. All of those displays needed to be changed back to the original color combinations. That was a long process for the club members. For many years following that the club members would remove the displays from the storage facility every October. They then would check all of the bulbs in the displays for burned out or broken bulbs, which inevitably

remove a broken bulb, without unplugging the display. You could hear the yelp across the park!

The Rotary wheel near the entrance to the park, was made by the family of Daybreak Rotarian, Gretchen Winger.

This is such a community tradition that in 2014, when

extension cords were stolen one night, the community immediately made donations to replace all the cords so they could open! And then in January 2018, before everything was put away, a dog was rescued from the adjacent Caney River using the extension cords!

Although there is no admission fee, donations are accepted. 2020 was a record breaking year as driving through the park was something Inormal to do during the isolation of COVID-19. Once the expenses are paid, money is set aside to purchase or repair displays and a budgeted amount goes to Bartlesville Daybreak Foundation to cover educational scholarships to students in the Washington County area.

The club provides 2 University Scholarships each year of

\$5,000 in total; the recipients receive \$625 per semester for 8 semesters if they keep up their grades, etc. This way the club always has 8 students in process. New this year is the addition of scholarships for vocational training at Tri County Tech.

A new event was started in 2019 called Fantasy Land on Foot. It is the only time you can walk the road through the park. The event was created when the club lit up a new display in memory of our Big Elf, Randy Weatherly, who unexpectedly passed away during the 2018 Fantasy Land season; Randy was the person who got Daybreak started on this annual project.

Sherri Wilt, the President of the Bartlesville Chamber of Commerce noted, FLOL is such a wonderful addition to the Christmas season. The magically lit park with all the displays is a unique draw not only for our local residents to enjoy but draws regional people here as well, which is always a win for our community. The chamber so appreciates all the work Rotary puts into this project. Families look forward to it each year and it has become a family holiday tradition for so many.

Congratulations to the Bartlesville Daybreak Rotary club for its Signature Project!

Rotary 101 - July 2021

Rotary 101 is a monthly column highlighting the many facets of our wonderful organization.

How do you describe Rotary? If asked, do you fumble a bit then say "we eat lunch a lot"? There are so many characteristics of a Rotary club, as well as the activities of 1.2 million Rotarians there are the features of service, internationality, fellowship, classifications of each vocation, development of goodwill and world understanding, the emphasis of high ethical standards, concern for other people and many more. (whew!)

In 1976 the Rotary International Board of Directors was interested in creating a concise definition of the fundamental aspects of Rotary. They turned to the three men who were then serving on Rotary so Public Relations Committee and requested that a one-sentence definition of Rotary be prepared. After numerous drafts, the committee presented this definition, which has been used ever since in various Rotary publications:

"Rotary is an organization of business and professional persons united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build goodwill and peace in the world.

Those 31 words are worth remembering when someone asks, **\$**What is a Rotary club?




Be "In the Zone"
