4-PEAT!

Taken from HANNAH WHITTEN in ESPN April 2016 Winning a championship is a special feat for any team. But winning three or more championships in a row? That's nearly impossible, and few have been able to do it.

Take a look at some special teams that have won multiple titles in a row -- sometimes more than once:

Boston Celtics

Championship streak: 1959-66

The Celtics won eight NBA championships in a row from 1959 to 1966. Their streak is the longest consecutive title run of any professional

team in U.S. sports history.

Montreal Canadiens

Championship streaks: 1956-60, 1976-79

The Canadiens have taken home the Stanley Cup more times than any other NHL team. They have won 24 all told, including five in a row from 1956 to 1950 and four in a row from 1976 to 1979.

New York Islanders

Championship streak: 1980-83

The Islanders won the Stanley Cup four years in a row. They won an astonishing 19 consecutive playoff series during that streak. The franchise was a dynasty in the 1980s.

New York Yankees

Championship streaks: 1936-39, 1949-53, 1998-2000

The Yankees boast an astonishing 27 World Series titles, which is an MLB record. They've gone on numerous streaks, taking home four championships in a row from 1936 to 1939, five in a row from 1949 to 1953 and three in a row from 1998 to 2000.

North Carolina Tar Heels

Championship streaks: 1986-94

In perhaps the most impressive championship streak, the North Carolina Tar Heels women's soccer team won *nine* national championships in a row from 1986 through 1994. The Tar Heels have won 21 of the 31 NCAA soccer championships.

UCLA Bruins

Championship streak: 1967-73

The Bruins won seven consecutive national titles in men's basketball from 1967 to 1973 under head coaching legend John Wooden. The Bruins won 10 titles in a 12-year span under Wooden. UCLA also went undefeated four times in 1964, '67, '72 and '73.

Last Week's Program, June 23, 2020

Last week's speaker was Slade Mitchell, Energy Marketing Administrator for Jonesboro City Water and Light. He talked about the new clean energy project coming to Jonesboro. With two coal-fueled power plants shutting down within the next decade, the city is looking for other ways to generate electricity.



One of the ways to generate this power is a solar power system. The plant will be built on 98 acres at the Craighead Technology Park. The

system will bring 125 new jobs to Arkansas, including consultants, engineers, construction, and other related workers. The first year, it is expected to generate 24,292 megawatts hours (MW) of energy, which is enough to power 1600 homes annually. The plant should be operational by December 2021.

Why solar power? Mainly, the price has come down, it enhances a diversified portfolio, and it serves as a viable alternative to the impending "cease to use coal." CWL continues to work hard keeping the rates low and the service reliable. Its electricity cost 60% of the national average, its water 33%, and its wastewater 28 - 44%.
