From the first 55 �Founder � freshmen (of whom, 51 have returned as juniors) the current freshman enrollment is 75, the maximum they can accommodate.

John C Ericsen Club Executive Secretary Webmaster brotherhood begins with a three-week required leadership term in which students get to know each other, work through challenges, and build bonds based on acceptance, affirmation, and accountability for each other.

The vision of the school is for its graduates to lead in the home, serve in the Church, engage in meaningful work, and transform their communities.

The school has added athletic teams in wrestling and football and has adopted the mascot �wolfpack � to denote how the strength of a pack is the wolf and the strength of the individual wolf is in the pack. This PACK system is actualized as groups of 10 to 11 students meet each day with a staff member to discuss real-world issues, problems facing any member of the pack, and how they can be of help to each other.

Executing the school s programs is very challenging and requires many partners. Four or five seminary students volunteer entire days on campus to work with students. Counseling services from Christian Family Solutions are provided for students dealing with a range of emotional issues. Volunteer and servant leader opportunities are provided for residents in the neighborhood such as raking and snow shoveling. One large project entailed the construction of a two-car garage for a neighbor whose husband had died before it could be built.

Kevin described the importance of internships for juniors so these young men can gain some real-world work experience. Members were encouraged to think of business opportunities that might lend themselves to such paid internships.

Kevin thanked our Rotary Club for its support, not only for sponsoring the high school  $\clubsuit$ s Rotary Interact Club but also for being the second donor to support the school.

We thanked Kevin for an interesting update on this vitally important school in our city and wished him continued success. We also wish he would make his attendance a more frequent phenomenon.

Before adjourning the meeting, a paltry \$10 bill from Rich Mannisto was sufficient to fend off an acknowledged bad joke from our Skipper.
