Bill Bode provided an ex corde (that s Latin for soft the cuffs) invocation in which he acknowledged the passing of a long-time friend of our Rotary Club, Brigid Rooney.

Anne pointed out that Tom Kirchen will be celebrating a birthday on Friday and Bill and Rita Makal are celebrating their twentieth wedding anniversary today. Congratulations, all.

We were very pleased to welcome a prospective member, Josh Mowka. He and his father attended our membership event. He expressed interest in joining our club and in learning more about Rotary and what we do in the community. Welcome, Josh!

Bill Bode informed us that son Taylor and his wife had a baby boy on July 7. The new grandson ♦s name is Remy (sp?) Michael Bode. Bill and Jeannie plan to visit them in San Diego the last week in August.

Bev and Gerv Rose announced the arrival of their first great grandchild, Eleanor Louise.

In other news, President Anne provided an update on her husband, Terry, who is still hospitalized. He had surgery to perform a cervical fusion last week. He is slowly recuperating, but is having trouble talking, and although he is doing some walking will probably be transferred to a rehab facility within a few days.

Tom Kirchen indicated that a sign-up sheet and/or online reservation notice needs to be sent out to the membership for our club picnic. The picnic is schedule for August 18 and will begin at 5:00 p.m.

Paul Vandeveld introduced Brian Leahy from Tosa Tonight. Brian is a long time Wauwatosa resident, musician, and event organizer. He has his own group, Leahy s Luck, and is a member of the Differentials. He has been involved for many years with Tosa Tonight and is on their board of directors.

In off the cuff remarks, Brian first gave kudos to the leadership of Paul Roller, Tom Rowe and Ed Ward, who in their own ways contributed to the development and funding of the Rotary Performance Pavilion at Hart Park and the creation of Tosa Tonight. The effort of our Rotary Club to raise the money and construct this entertainment venue, in Brian so opinion, reflects the cultural values of both the City and Rotary.

The concert series began in 1998 when the Wauwatosa Historical Society planned a three-concert series. The following year, another series was provided, but the Mayor at the time, Maricolette Walsh, and other community leaders recognized the lack of infrastructure and the need for a permanent family oriented entertainment venue.

With the need for such a facility generally recognized, former alderman and Rotarian Tom Rowe took up the cause and began doing research around community entertainment facilities. He shared his dream with Paul Roller who led fund raising efforts.

Construction began in 2008 after many delays and political hurdles to overcome. Because our country was in a recession and because Rotarian Bill Bode was a brutal negotiator and manager of the bidding process, the actual cost was in the range of \$800,000, well below the projected cost of \$1.2 million.

While Brian acknowledged the Performance Pavilion as a lasting legacy of our club, he also challenged us to think about Rotary future and its need to sustain its mission and service to the community.

Thanks, Brian, for an interesting presentation, reminding us that Rotary service never ends.

Brian closed by singing an Irish song in honor of Ed Ward. (Lyrics copied below)

Of all the money that e'er I had I spent it in good company And all the harm I've ever done Alas, it was to none but me And all I've done for want of wit To memory now I can't recall

So fill to me the parting glass Good night and joy be to you all So fill to me the parting glass And drink a health whate'er befalls Then gently rise and softly call Good night and joy be to you all

To bring a conclusion to our meeting and to demonstrate that our club hasn totally lost its pipes, we gustily sang Happy Birthday to Tom Kirchen.

There being nothing else to sing or celebrate, the meeting was adjourned.
