

A Literacy Log for a Meeting of
The Rotary Club of Wauwatosa
November 3, 2021

This recounting of the proceedings of a meeting of the Rotary Club of Wauwatosa presumes sufficient reading proficiency on the part of its audience to comprehend its contents. However, the vocabulary and writing style contained herein reflect only the literacy level of your humble bulletin editor and are not intended to represent the members of the club.

After calling the meeting to order, President Anne led us in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and the Rotary 4-Way Test. The invocation was offered by Richard Frenn and consisted of sharing the 23rd Psalm, with a short addendum calling for mercy on the Packers.

Mike Mitchell is celebrating a birthday this Saturday and Paul and Kathleen Roller are observing their 41st wedding anniversary.

Happy, sad, and meh news:

- We were saddened to hear from Tom Kirchen that he has been diagnosed with prostate cancer. He will be having a bone scan on Friday after which a treatment plan will be developed. He and MaryPat will be leaving for Florida on Sunday. Our thoughts and prayers go with him.
- Your humble bulletin editor was recently informed that the Civic Celebration Commission will be forwarding \$3,500 as their annual contribution toward the July 4th Kids From Wisconsin entertainment. Our treasurer will give an updated report when he returns.
- We will again be supporting high school students to attend Badger Boys and Girls State. We will be able to carry over the check from two years ago for the boy but a

check will have to be sent for the girl.

There being no other news to share, our program chair for the day, Paul Roller, introduced Dr. Tracey Sparrow, president of Next Door Milwaukee. She has worked in education for over three decades, holding leadership positions in Milwaukee and Chicago. Her expertise is in leadership, team building, and building community partnerships. Next Door is committed to high quality early childhood education and family support and serves over 1,400 children from birth to age five.



Dr. Sparrow describes Next Door as performing the most important work in Milwaukee. They have two centers: their Metcalfe Park campus at 29th and Clarke, and the Midtown facility at 53rd and Capitol. They also provide in-home services in seven different languages. Their Books for Kids program distributes about 80,000 books per year.

Dr. Sparrow shared the results of a study that examined the volume of children's brains and especially the frontal cortex. There is a noted disparity in the size of children's brains when correlated with income and parent education. The poorer and less educated the parents, the smaller the frontal cortex. This has an immediate impact on vocabulary development.

The third grade reading scores of children in the Milwaukee Public Schools has shown continued decline from 2016 to 2021. This score is the leading predictor of high school graduation rates. Only about 6% of MPS students are reading proficient in the third grade. In contrast, Next Door language scores demonstrate their incredible success with proficiency levels of 85% in 2019 and 81% in 2020 when much of the instruction was done virtually.

Next Door's programs are grounded in the following principles:

- Intensive family engagement
- Data utilization
- High quality teaching practices
- Embedded professional development

Dr. Sparrow described the steps taken during the COVID pandemic to make sure that their children were served and that their staff was supported:

- Closed March 17 through June 1, 2020
- Installed air purifiers; temperature monitors, water fountains, drop off procedures,
- Parent educators did virtual home visits,
- Modified PTO plan,
- No layoffs or furloughs
- Reopened June 1 and stayed open
- Quickly developed and implemented a plan for virtual learning for that period all staff worked remotely
- All staff and children over 3 must wear masks
- All staff are tested weekly
- Provided home testing kits to families with a child that tests positive
- Followed MKE Health Department quarantine protocol
- Vaccine clinics were established on site
- Implemented mandatory vaccination, per federal requirements

Turning the challenge of the pandemic into an opportunity for excellence, Next Door developed a focus on Accelerating Equity.

- Because many children had no formal instruction during the pandemic, accelerators were developed, including tutors for every one to two children.
- Additional reading specialists were hired
- Next Door accelerated partnerships. For example, the Next Step Clinic is located on campus to provide mental health services.
- Speech and language services were advanced
- Family ambassadors were employed to connect families for mutual support
- They developed a focus on staff and staff wellness and hired a success coach to work with them.
- They funded innovation projects, one of which is a virtual reality project to provide real world experiences for children

They created a guided play project and remodeled areas of the building to create activity spaces around themes such as the ocean and outer space

- A Nutrition and sleep project is aimed at building healthy habits for good health
- A robotics project enables students to develop critical thinking skills
- A classroom baby project involved volunteer young mothers bringing their infants to school to demonstrate good nurturing behavior

Next Door recently celebrated its 50th anniversary and raised sufficient funds for remodeling spaces for student activity and reading. Dr. Sparrow concluded by sharing a short video which visually took us into the facilities to experience what the children see every day.
