

A Few Senior Moments from The Rotary Club of Wauwatosa
November 10, 2021

Our meeting began today with a resounding gong, compliments of Bev Rose. Who says those seniors can to be strong and assertive!! After reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, resident intergenerational prayer-boy, Jonathan Lorenzen, offered an invocation.

[NOTE: Because old-timer Tom Kirchen joined the meeting today via Zoom on your humble bulletin editor s laptop, notes of this meeting were hand transcribed and are subject to significant gaps in memory.]

It seems that there were no birthdays, partner birthdays, wedding anniversaries or club anniversaries to observe this past week. Therefore, we had no occasion to sing.

Tom Kirchen reported that nut orders are ready to be picked up and delivered.

President Anne reminded everyone of the Christmas Party which will take place on December 8 at Bluemound Country Club. JJ will play the piano and accompany caroling after dinner. The social hour will begin at 5:30 and dinner will be served at 6:30. Anne encouraged us to invite friends. Invitations have been sent to past Rotarians. The link to the registration site has been sent out.

Our club has committed to ringing bells for the Salvation Army on December 4th from noon to 7:00 p.m. A signup sheet was circulated.

Anne reminded everyone that there will be no noon meeting on November 24, the day before Thanksgiving.

We have also been invited to join the Mayfair Rotary Club and the Radisson Hotel in hosting a blood drive on December 2nd at the Radisson.

Anne turned the meeting over to our program chair for the day, Gerv Rose, who introduced the new CEO of St. Camillus, Shannon Angell who spoke to us about the services provided by St. Camillus A Life Plan Community. Shannon has been the CEO of St. Camillus for only two months, although she has been with the organization for over two years.



The tag line is significant in that it represents a shift in thinking about the traditional continuum of care offered to seniors. A Life Plan Community should offer more than one level of care on a single campus, have a focus on an active lifestyle and wellness, be integrated into the community with an emphasis on giving back and being socially responsible.

St. Camillus offers the full continuum of care: independent living, assisted living, memory care, skilled nursing and short-term rehabilitation. They also have a home health and hospice division which offers inhome supports.

The new 18-story resident tower, currently under construction, includes 144 apartments and will offer many enhanced amenities including: a fitness center with swimming pool and yoga studio, on-site medical center, educational and volunteer opportunities, four dining venues, an on-site bank, library and convenience store.

The memory care unit includes 65 apartments in 3 neighborhoods and offers medication management, 24-hour staff, all meals and snacks, housekeeping, laundry, recreation therapy and a medical director. These services address those areas of daily living that have become difficult or impossible for individuals on their own. Similarly, the 76 apartments designated for assisted living include all the same services but without the concerns around memory loss.

We thank Shannon for a very informative presentation. Wauwatosa is very fortunate to have such highly rated services and facilities for seniors.
