



- Tom Kirchen dutifully attended his Florida property owners association meeting and
 was promptly elected its treasurer. His first task is to fire the management company.

- Bill and Jeannie Bode had dinner recently with Craig and Lynn Schmutzer. Craig has a new job at Westbury Bank in Brookfield. Their family is doing well and Craig extends his greetings to all.
- Mary Lou Del Balso, wife of former member Jim Del Balso passed away on November 19
- · It was also noted that former member Chuck Rushman passed away.

A plethora of announcements were shared by President Anne and various other members:

- We will hold our annual Christmas Party at Bluemound Golf & Country Club next Wednesday. There will be NO NOON MEETING. Jonathan Lorenzen reported that so far, 26 have registered. The social hour will begin at 5:30 with dinner being served at 6:30. JJ will provide Christmas music on the piano and then accompany us for carol singing after dinner.
- Members were reminded that the Salvation Army bell ringing will be held this Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Macy s Mall entrance.
- Tom Kirchen again thanked those members who picked up their nuts and delivered them.
- President Anne announced that an annual meeting of the Club to elect officers for next year will be held December 15th beginning at 11:15 at the Hotel. All members should be in attendance!!
- Support for the victims and families of the Waukesha Christmas Parade tragedy was raised. Robert Niedermann informed the Club that our Foundation has already contributed \$1,000 to the United Way Waukesha Community Fund.
- Robert also distributed the annual appeal letter under the theme: Every Rotarian.
 Every Year! Last year our members contributed \$6,200 to the Wauwatosa Rotary Foundation and the Rotary International Foundation. Robert also shared thank you notes from Habitat for Humanity, the Tosa Cares food pantry, and Tosa Food Pantry for our Foundation support of their efforts.



Program chair for the day John Sebald introduced his ♦ super fabulous wife ♦ Kristi Sebald who provided an update on the activities of Habitat for Humanity. She pointed out that our club has supported Habitat for Humanity since 1996.

Besides building new homes for low income people in targeted communities, Habitat has added a Critical Home Repair service line to assist homeowners with low interest loans to remediate the challenges often encountered in older homes, including electrical wiring and lead pipes.

Habitat had established a goal to build 100 homes in Milwaukee s Midtown. The 100th home will be dedicated this spring. They are now shifting focus to the Harambee neighborhood bounded by North Avenue

on the South, Capital Drive on the North and from I-43 to West 7th Street. Their goal is to build 90 new homes in the area.

Pre-pandemic they built about 25 homes per year. During and immediately after the pandemic, they have only managed to build • 11 in 2020 and 15 in 2021. Still, the goal remains the same • to build block by block until the goal is achieved.

She provided a printed handout which contained some interesting nuggets of information. For example:

- The average annual income in the Harambee neighborhood is only \$19,000.
- Only 22% of the homes in that area are owner occupied. Generally, when 60% of homes are owner occupied, neighborhoods are deemed stable.
- On average, crime decreased 46% on the blocks in Washington Park where Habitat for Humanity built homes.
- 87% of children of Habitat homeowners graduate from high school � 30% higher than MPS.
- Not only do Habitat homes save Milwaukee taxpayers money from vacant or foreclosed homes, but Habitat homeowners pay close to \$1 million in property taxes each year.

Thanks for a most interesting presentation, Kristi. It is great to know that our Club s investment in Habitat for Humanity is having a positive impact on the community.
