PROGRAM:

MARTI GUTWEIN and her family had an adventure of a lifetime when they went to Mt. Everest Base Camp in May of 2019. Note that they did NOT summit Mt. Everest. However, the trekking was nonetheless rigorous and difficult. Their trip began when they flew to Kathmandu, Nepal. In this mountainous area, the paths are rocky and steep. They crossed some suspension bridges but were certain not to do so when a mule train was crossing. There is no motorized transportation up to Base Camp, only mules, yaks, and oxen to carry all goods, food, and supplies. The religion of the Nepalese is Buddhism and so no animal killing is permitted. The Gutweins were advised not to eat meat as it would not have been refrigerated properly during transportation. Meals were often comprised of potatoes, eggs, rice, and vegetables. Sherpas who accompanied them on the trip were a guide, an assistant guide and two porters who carried all of their gear. They stayed in teahouses along the way. Accommodations were adequate but not luxurious. A unique item of clothing that they found quite helpful was a buff. This tube of fabric acted as hair band, earmuffs, and face mask to protect them from dust and odors. On day eight they reached Base Camp and were able to take some photos. However, the weather took a turn for the worse and they were

required to leave quickly to start their descent. They enjoyed seeing the beautiful scenery that was on a scale too grand to describe. Although they were glad to return home, it was an unforgettable experience!

There were 16 members present. On Zoom there were 32 members. DAVID STRAND, Assistant DG zoomed in as well.
