Born on July 4, 1941, in Gary, Indiana, Keith will be sorely missed across the

Bloomington community. Always ready to provide light and guidance to those around him, he emceed the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade and Canopy of Lights for many years and was a member of the MCCSC board for 12 years. He was beloved as program director at WTIU and admired as a teacher, mentor, and colleague at Ivy Tech. # **OUR PROGRAM: CARDINAL STAGE**







Two members of the <u>Cardinal Stage Theater</u> leadership team, artistic director Kate Galvin and managing director Gabe Gloden were introduced by next year's club president, **Sally Gaskill**.

Over a period of 15 years, Cardinal became the largest arts organization in the region with an annual budget of \$1 million. Producing theater since the beginning of the pandemic has been challenging to say the least, and yet, with Cardinal's innovative spirit, programming has been as varied and engaging as ever. Since last March, the organization has pushed itself to adapt and not just give up on trying to make art. Calling 2020-2021 the Season of Artistic Adventure, the organization continues to engage the mind, touch the soul, and connect to community.

Kate gave us an overview of the results of their extraordinary efforts over the past few months, including:

- Cardinal Play Dates, a monthly script-reading club, involving a gathering of artists from around the country
- A Social Dis-Dance Party in Dunn Meadow in July
- Cardinal At Home, 10-minute plays for audiences to enjoy at home or virtually with friends
- Family Photo Challenge, a social media contest that encouraged families to photograph familiar children's stories
- The Walkabout Radio Plays, commissions for two local playwrights that were set in Bloomington
- A Virtual Drama Club for actors in elementary and high school
- A set of Virtual Cabarets

February will bring a virtually produced production of Ordinary Days, a musical by Adam Gwon.



Gabe followed with an update on strategic planning within the organization, focusing mostly on the proposal to convert the much-loved John Waldron Arts Center into a vibrant, sustainable arts center through a partnership between Cardinal, the Bloomington Playwrights Project, and the Bloomington Academy of Film & Theatre, with substantial financial support from the Cook Group. The proposal, which will be submitted to the City of Bloomington for consideration, is designed to "preserve historic character, while evolving the space to continue to support the presentation of community-based art, while promoting operational sustainability."
