This Happened Last Monday

For those of us who were early, we attended break out rooms to network and take the opportunity to get to know our fellow Rotarians a bit better. Brian started the meeting and shared we had over 70 participants. Bill Nance gave the invocation. He spoke about the current three Vs in which we are all dealing: virus, violence, and voting. He suggests we concentrate on these three Vs as well - victoriously, vigilantly, vigorously. A reminder we can have those three Vs with God's help. The group then recited the three-way test and the pledge of allegiance. Bill then shared news headlines. Pennsylvania shows Biden in the lead; all eyes are on Wall Street; radio's 100th anniversary; and Rotary International voted in their first woman to hold office in 115 years. Congratulations to Jennifer Jones from Ontario for that honor. Kim Bramlage welcomed guests Michelle Beer - guest of Walt Hibner, Amanda Harrelson - guest of Amy Radachi, and Caroline Brokaw - also a guest of Amy Radachi. Kim shared the following announcements - time for the annual Dayton Public School Coat Drive. He previously served as Dayton's Associate Director from 2013 to 2017, Director of the Cincinnati VAMC from 2018 to 2020, and Director of the Chillicothe VAMC from 2017 to 2018. His VA career has included assignments as the Program Manager, VISN 10/11 Tele-Nurse Triage Program, Dayton, OH and Health System Specialist, Surgical Service at the VAMC Dayton,

OH. Before coming to the VA, following retirement from active duty, he worked for private sector companies and government contractors in the healthcare industry. Mary Bane gave a Day 100 to the coat fund in celebration of her first full meeting as a Rotarian. Holly Wiggins gave a Day 10 as a reminder that residents in Montgomery County can still apply for utility assistance through the CARES Act. Diane Farrell gave a Day 100 in honor of the article written in which she was featured as well about COVID, as the new Burkhardt branch of the library to open in a year in a half. Penny Wolf gave a Day 50 in honor of son's birthday who is an attorney. She wished to recognize him as a trail blazer and honor his pioneer spirit. Kim then recognized our newest Rotarians, Matthew Jessup and Mark Murdock. Matthew is a Wright State graduate who has a successful wealth management firm in Oakwood. He is also a husband, a father to three children ages 9, 5, and 4, and has a new Goldendoodle named Louie. A Centerville grad, he loves wine, travel, and golf. Mark Murdock is the current Director of the Dayton VA Medical Center. He came back to Dayton from the Cincinnati VA after working as the Operating Officer at the Dayton VA previously. Mark is retired from the Air Force, is married to a Daytonian, came back to Dayton to raise his family, has traveled the world, and also enjoys golf. He is an alumni of Xavier University where he received his Master's degree.

President Brian Martin then took over and mentions that today was a historic day for Dayton Rotary. On November 2nd 1987, the Dayton Rotary constitution was changed and became gender neutral. Virginia Kettering received an honorary membership. Later that month, six additional women became members. As Brian shared, "women invaded Rotary". Brian gave a Day 33 in honor of Rotary becoming gender neutral. Brian introduced Jack Lohbeck, Chair of the Day. Jack met Amy Radachi, President and CEO of Rebuilding Together Dayton (RTD), in January of 1998 when she was awarded a grant from the Rotary Foundation. Being in the construction industry, what Amy shared resonated with Jack. Jack became involved with RTD, including becoming a part of their Board of Directors. Amy's presentation was titled Where Home is Where the Hazard Is. She noted that we are lucky enough to have access to electricity, a working bathroom, a roof that doesn't leak, and so much more. We live in safe and healthy homes. So many others are not so lucky. Amy's goal is to help raise awareness about this issue.

Amy shared the following stats from 2019.

- 67% of the people RTD helped were female heads of household
- \$18,167 was their median income
- 74 is the average age of the homeowner
- 31 was the average number of years the homeowner had lived in their home
- 60% had a disabled family member living in the home with them
- 1,215 volunteers spend over 7,956 hours assisting with these families
- 133 homes were served.

Amy shared a 25 point assessment RTD uses to evaluate the homes they will serve with questions such as: do they have a safe ingress and egress, access to a working water heater, basic appliances, adequate lighting, and more.

RTD is currently focusing their efforts on the Pineview, Lakeview, Madden Hills, Miami Chapel, and Edgemont neighborhoods. They also helped a great deal after the memorial tornadoes - from Brookville to State Route 68.

Amy shared stories of the families RTD helped with including one man who was sharing his home with raccoons. RTD helped seal up the home, repairing damage made by the critters. She shared about another homeowner in the Edgemont neighborhood who lost her first home to a fire, and now needed help with her home of 38 years. When she applied for help, she was 77 years old, and had lived her life as a caretaker. Now homebound, she needed help herself. RTD was able to install an outside ramp and turned a 1st floor pantry into a bathroom so she could return to the activities she loved.

Amy went on to report that as a community and country, shelter in place mandates have meant that over 30 million Americans are now trapped in unsafe homes. That spending a few thousand dollars on home repairs for underserved populations is much cheaper than the funding needed to place those same people in nursing facilities. RTD had to cancel their main fundraising event due to COVID, but they have not stopped their work. They now use more skilled labor than volunteers, but have also gotten creative with fundraising efforts anyone can do from home. This included putting together Safe and Healthy Home kits with items such as cleaning supplies, flashlights, batteries, and more. Amy also shared how individuals can take on projects like Rotarian Frank Kivuyo. Frank reached out to Amy to help, and ended up doing yard work for an 86 year old woman in need. He also came back to help her with small projects around the house.

Another area of need is warehouse space. Their current location at the Job Center is no longer available to them. If anyone has or knows of 2,000sf or so of warehouse space where RTD can store their supplies and tools without cost, please let Amy know. As always, monetary donations are also needed. RTD has over 70 homeowners on their list, already exceeding 2019. Amy then shared feedback from a homeowner who had spent three winters without a furnace, and two without water. He shared that his "gratitude knows no bounds" for the help he received from RTD.

Questions from the Rotarians were entertained, including how RTD works with Habitat for Humanity (H4H gives people their first home, RTD helps with individuals aging in their forever homes); as well as an opportunity to partner with United Rehabilitation Services for funding those with disabilities who need home repairs. Lastly, she was asked about her largest surprise in her years at RTD. Amy shared her disappointment in how the funding for the Memorial Day tornadoes has been handled. Brian Martin then thanked Amy for a great presentation and closed the meeting.
